INVESTIGATIVE SUMMARY:

This is an "Operation Iraqi Freedom" investigation.

This investigation was initiated upon notification of Mr. Al-Jamadi's death while being detained at Abu Ghraib Prison.

Investigation revealed that on 4 Nov 03, members of U.S. Navy Seal Team Seven (ST-7) located Mr. Al-Jamadi at his residence south of Baghdad, Iraq. Mr. Al-Jamadi allegedly resisted apprehension and was taken into custody after a physical altercation with a ST-7 member. Mr. Al-Jamadi was placed in the rear of a High Mobility Multi Wheeled Vehicle (HMMWV) and driven to FOB St. Michael, where he was repeatedly kicked, punched and struck with weapons by ST-7 members.

Mr. Al-Jamadi was then driven to Baghdad International Airport (BIAP) where he was interrogated by members of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). Following his

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interrogation, Mr. Al-Jamadi was transported to Abu Ghraib Prison. During an interrogation at the prison conducted by CIA personnel, Mr. Al-JAMADI died.

The Final Autopsy Report listed the cause of Mr. AL-JAMADI's death as blunt force injuries of the torso complicated by compromised respiration, and the manner of Mr. Al-JAMADI's death as homicide.

The Naval Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS) has assumed responsibility for this investigation and has declined any further assistance from CID. NCIS has not identified any of the subjects of their investigation to this office.







MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: Report of Investigation 0237-03-CID259-61219 - 5 H

- 1. This memorandum is to clarify or further explain incidents that occurred with ROI 0237-03-CID259-61219.
- a. SA was originally notified of the death of Mr. Al JAMADI approximately 2200, unknown date, by CW5. The state of Mr. Al JAMADI approximately 2200, unknown date, by CW5. The state of Military Group Operations Officer, Camp Victory, Baghdad, Iraq. SA responded to the Group Headquarters where he was questioned about a death at the Abu Ghraib Prison. SA responded Mr. That he had worked a prison death case earlier in the day. Mr. Stated that CID Command had been requested by the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) to look into the death of Mr. JAMADI.

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JAMADI

- SA reviewed the case file from the death that he investigated earlier in the day and determined that the deceased was not Mr. JAMADI. SA contacted the Abu Ghraib Prison and verified that there was a second body at the prison, which had not been reported to CID. SA was directed by the 10th Military Police Battalion and 3rd Military Police Group to respond to the prison the next morning. The delay in responding to the incident was due to the unit not having crew served weapons and the threat of night time movements from the Baghdad International Airport (BIAP) and the Abu Ghraib Prison were extremely high.
- b. SA along with several other unit personnel including the Special Agent in Charge, (CW2 responded to the scene the first thing the next morning.
- c. SA and unit personnel arrived on scene and was escorted by LTC (NFI) to the cell block where Mr. JAMADI was located. Mr. JAMADI was in the shower area on the second floor. Mr. JAMADI was in a body bag and had been iced down.
- d. LTC was informed that the body needed to be transported to BIAP for an autopsy. LTC was a stated he did not have an ambulance that he could spare from the facility to transport the body to the mortuary affairs.
- e. LTC stated he was concerned that if Mr. JAMADI was taken out of the cell block in a body bag, it could cause unrest on the part of the other detainees.



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- f. LTC requested his medical personnel take Mr. JAMADI out on a stretcher to an ambulance outside of the prison to give the appearance that Mr. JAMADI was receiving medical care and was not deceased. A decision was made to allow Mr. JAMADI to be taken out of the prison on a stretcher to avoid possible unrest or a riot by the prison inmates.
- g. Medical personnel arrived and placed Mr. JAMADI onto a stretcher, with the body bag unzipped and tucked under the body. Mr. JAMADI was covered with a blanket and an IV line was taped to his arm. The IV was not inserted into the body. Mr. JAMADI was placed into an ambulance and transported to the helicopter landing pad area, out of sight of the other inmates.
- h. At the helicopter landing pad area, Mr. JAMADI was containerized in the body bag and placed into SA HUMMWV. SA and team transported Mr. JAMADI from the Abu Ghraib Prison directly to the BIAP mortuary affairs for an autopsy.

DETAILS

Basis for Investigation: About 2245, 4 Nov 03, SA was notified by CW5 Group Group Operations Officer, 3rd Military Police Group (CID), of the death of an Iraqi national at the Abu Ghraib prison.

Between 1000 and 1030, 5 Nov 03, SA conducted a death scene examination of the prison shower on the second floor of the prison.

CHARACTERISTICS OF THE SCENE: The shower room is located on the second floor of the Abu Ghraib prison in wing A-1, along the western wall or the northern wing. The room is constructed of concrete and cinder block material with a drain along the west wall, centered between north and south. The shower room is approximately 10 foot wide and 20 foot long. The shower room has a concrete floor and a concrete ceiling. The shower room has a window along the west wall near the north end of the room. The window has bars and a cage over it to prevent anyone from escaping. The shower room has a doorway along the east wall with a door made of bars. Also along the east wall are three other doorways with bars, which have been locked shut and do not open. The shower room is equipped with two fluorescent lights along the east wall. One of the fluorescent lights did not work.

condition of the scene: The shower room was clean of debris. There was a meal ready to eat box in the center of the room near the north wall. There was a plastic bag with an orange jump suit and trash located next to the door along the east wall. There was a plastic bottle of chlorine located next to the plastic bag. There was a black in color body bag along the south wall, with the deceased individual inside. There were no stains on the floor or wall area at the time of the exam. There were sheets placed over the bar doors, to prevent people from seeing into the room. There were no unusual odors detected.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS: The temperature outside was approximately 90 degrees Fahrenheit and the sun was shining. The temperature inside was approximately 80 degrees Fahrenheit. There was no precipitation in the past twenty-four hours.

FACTORS PERTINENT TO ENTRY/EXIT: Access to the scene could only be gained through the main doorway into the shower room.

SCENE DOCUMENTATION: A crime scene sketch was prepared by SA SA Section exposed photographs of the scene utilizing a Kodak EasyShare DX4900 digital camera built in flash.

SEARCH FOR LATENT IMPRESSIONS: A search for latent impressions was not conducted due to the personnel being present at the scene not being in question.

Dr. stated when he arrived on scene, the man was laying on his stomach. Dr. stated he checked the bedy for vital signs, which met with negative results. Dr. stated he did not take any life saving measures once he determined the man was dead. Dr. stated the man had not been dead long, when he arrived. Dr. stated he did notice injuries to the mans face when he was checking him for vital signs.

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

DETAILS

About 0900, 5 Nov 03, SA Forensic Science Officer, 10th Military Police Battalion, Baghdad International Airport (BIAP), APO AE 09335, was notified an Iraqi prisoner had died during an interrogation while at the US Coalition prison located at Abu Graib, IZ. The prisoner was identified as Mr. Manadel Al-JAMADI (NFI).

About 1300, 5 Nov 03, SA Coordinated this investigation with SSG NCOIC, Mortuary Affairs, 54th Quartermaster Battalion, BIAP, APO AE 09335. SA examined the remains of Mandal Al-JAMAIDI at the mortuary on Baghdad International Airport.

Mr Al-JAMAIDI was a Caucasian male about 40 years of age. The body was in full rigor and lividtiy was set.

His right eye had suffered blunt trauma with bruising and swelling. His septum was partially deviated. One of his front teeth was chipped and there was blood in his mouth.

There was a linear abrasion about 4 to 5 inches in length on his right fore arm.

There were a number of bruises and abrasions on the right knee. There were also abrasions and bruises on the left knee.

There was bruising on the right and left wrist indicative of the wrists being bound with a ligature. The ankles had similar bruises indicative of the ankles also being bound with a ligature.

There were several wounds on the right hand but appeared to be in different stages of healing. There was a lack of defense wounds on either hand.

There was a bruise on his anterior left thigh.

There was a pattern abrasion over his anterior lower left rib cage.

There were a number of bruises over his anterior left shoulder. These bruises were small and circular possibly made by a hand or by fingers.

There was a bruise over his left posterior buttocks.

There was a deformity in the lumbar section of the spine on the posterior back. There was no associated swelling or bruising, however.

There were several old surgical scars. One was over his left lateral ilium and one was over the lumbar section of his spinal cord.

There was a wound on the left foot that appeared to be healing and older.

There was a pattern abrasion over his lateral right ilium.

About 0830, 9 Nov 03, SA assisted Commander (Dr) Navy, Deputy Medical Examiner, Office of the Medical Examiner, Armed Forces Institute of Pathology, 1413 Research Blvd, Building 102, Rockville, MD 20850, in conducting an autopsy on the remains of Mr Al-JAMADI. The manner and cause of death were undetermined. There were a number of blunt force injuries but none that would cause death. The heart, brain and spinal cord were unremarkable. There were a number of broken ribs, but they were consistent with life saving measures (CPR). There were hemorrhages over the temporal muscles and a right periorbital contusion, but not enough to affect the brain or cause death. prepared a Preliminary Autopsy Report (see report for details). The final autopsy report was pending toxicology and a closer review of the heart and brain. also provided a CD Rom containing photos taken during the autopsy (see CD Rom for details).

On 4 NOV 03, I was assigned to tier 1A located at the "hardsite" of the ABU GHRUYEB Prison. My shift that day was from 0400 hrs to 1600 hrs. Sometime between 0400 and 0430 hrs, SSG brought a prisoner to my tier. I think SPC was with SSG but I am not certain. Following behind SSG and the prisoner were two OGA personnel, a Translator and an Interrogator. I had seen both OGA personnel on prior occasions. I met SSG on the first level of the tier to let him in the gate. The prisoner was dressed in an orange jump suit and had a green plastic sandbag over his head. His hands were handcuffed behind his back and his legs were shackled. The prisoner was difficult to control and was flailing back and forth. Due to his actions, SSG and I applied an "underhook" arm bar technique to control the prisoner as we walked him up the stairs and into the shower room. Per the direction of the OGA personnel, I secured the prisoner to the bars on the window with leg irons by placing one end on the handcuffs and the other on the window bar. SSG was present when I secured the prisoner to the window bars. The prisoner could stand without discomfort but he would probably have experienced discomfort if he tried to sit. After helping put the prisoner in the shower room I left to perform other duties. About 30-45 minutes later, the OGA personnel called for me. I responded to the shower room and saw the prisoner slouched in the corner on his knees. The OGA personnel stated something to the effect of "I guess he doesn't want to talk to us anymore, go find him a cell." I suspected that the prisoner and then called for SGT some slouched and I applied pressure to a pressure point on the prisoner's jaw since, at this point, I believed he was faking it. The prisoner did not respond to this application of pressure so I suspected something was seriously wrong. We removed the
other facial injuries. SGT and a lettached the prisoner from the window and removed his
handcuffs. We tilted the prisoner forward and a large amount of blood poured from his mouth. I radioed for a medic and my NCOIC. Two to three minutes later, SSG responded to my
location and we waited for the medics to arrive. At one point an Iraqi Doctor appeared at the
scene. I don't recall who, or how, the Iraqi Doctor was summoned. Both the OGA personnel
appeared to be excited about what to do. I left the shower room about five minutes after SSG
arrived to perform other duties. I was still working on my tier and I noticed several OGA
and Army personnel, including a Doctor, arrive to decide what to do with the body. I did not

A: SGT may have been down there. Also, the others that I mentioned earlier in my statement. Other than that, I don't think anyone else was there.

Q: Describe the demeanor of the OGA personnel before and after the interrogation?

A: Before, they were normal as like every other day. They took their gear off and grab a cup of coffee. Then they just went into the room. Afterwards, before we found out he was dead; they were just normal like every other day when they are finished with interviews. After we found out he was dead, they were nervous; they didn't know what in the hell to do. The short fat OGA guy said, "No ones ever died on me before when I interrogated them".

O: Did the OGA personnel make any statements about what happened?

A: They said the guy just quit talking and slouched down. When I told them I was calling my

NCOIC, the short OGA guy got on the phone and started calling somebody.

Q: Did you hear any noise coming from the shower room during the interrogation?

A: Not really. I was out on the tier working.

Q: How many times did you return to the shower room before the prisoner's body was removed?

A: I have no idea, but I went in every time medical personnel went in and out.

Q: Why did you go into the shower room on these occasions?

A: It was my tier and it is my responsibility to escort everyone unless an interview is going on.

Q: Why was ice placed on the prisoner's body?

A: It had already started smelling so we put ice on him. It happened at 0430-0500 hrs and we didn't put ice on him until midafternoon. OGA was there until about lunch and they just left.

They were trying earlier to figure out what to do with the body. The detainee did not have an ISN, so he was not ours yet. Back then OGA was a ghost organization.

Q: Did you see any stains on the shower room floor from bodily fluids to include blood?

A: Not stains, the only blood I saw was from his mouth when we put him on the ground.

Q: Do you know what happened to the sandbag that was on the prisoner's head?

A: Judging by the lump on the head, he got smacked on the head with something.

Q: Did you see the detainee's face or head before he entered the room?

A: No, he had the bag on when he came in.



BASIS FOR INVESTIGATION: About 0800, 17 Mar 04, this office received a request for assistance from the 75th MP DSE CID, Mosul, Iraq to make a forensic copy of an Compaq Laptop Computer and eight compact disks.

IMAGING OF LAPTOP HARD DISK, ITEM 1, DOCUMENT #0032-04: Between 2000--2300, 8 May 04, SA prepared a forensic image of the hard disk, removed from a Compaq laptop computer, Serial # seized as evidence and documented as item #1, voucher #0032-04. The hard disk was connected to a U.S. Government computer via a FastBloc hardware write protection device. The FastBloc was utilized to view the contents of the hard disk without editing any of the data contained within. The operating system loaded on the U.S. Government computer was Windows XP. The forensic software program EnCase version 4.16 was utilized to image the hard disk.

IMAGING OF EIGHT COMPACT DISK, ITEM 2, DOCUMENT #0032: Between 0900-2100, 9 May 04, SA prepared a forensic copies of the data contained on the eight compact disks, seized as evidence and documented as item #2, voucher #0032-04. The compact disks were inserted in the DVD/CD-RW drive of an U.S. Government computer. The operating system leaded on the U.S. Government computer was Windows XP. The forensic software program EnCase version 4.16 was utilized to copy the data of the compact disks.

Agent's Comment: All eight of the compact disks were rewrite able disks, while trying to make forensic image copies of the disks, EnCase would lock up, while trying to copying the unallocated clusters. Coordination with Guidance Software Technical Support Division revealed EnCase can not image re-write able disks if the disk has not been completely closed out and if the software utilized to make the disk is not the same burning software installed on the forensic computer. Utilizing EnCase Preview screen copies of all files contained on the compact disks were copied out to the forensic computer.

SUMMARY OF RELATED ACTIVITY: The Compaq laptop hard drive and the eight compact disks were forensically copied and transferred to a Western Digital Hard Drive, which was collected as evidence and forwarded to the Central Intelligence Agency, Washington DC. 



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EXTERNAL EXAMINATION

The body is that of a well-developed, well-nourished 5ft 10-inch tall, 165-pound (estimated) Caucasian male. Lividity is fixed on the posterior aspect of the body. Rigor is present and symmetric on all extremities. The temperature is cold, that of the refrigeration unit.

The scalp is covered with brown hair with temporal graying and frontal balding. Facial hair consists of a close trimmed brown and grey beard and mustache. The irides are brown and the pupils are round and equal in diameter. Petechial hemorrhages of the sclera are not present. The external auditory carrals are free of secretions and blood. The ears are unremarkable. The nares are patent. Injuries to the face will be described below in the "evidence of injury section". The nose and maxillae are palpably stable. The feeth are natural. Petechiae of the buccal mucos a are not present.

The neck is straight, and the trachea is midline and mobile. The chest is symmetric. The abdomen is flat. There is a well-healed 2 x 1/4-inch oblique scar on the left lower quadrant of the abdomen. There is a jagged irregular well-healed 6 x 2-inch horizontal scar extending from the lower left quadrant of the abdomen across the anterior lateral aspect of the left thigh. The genitalia are those of a normal adult male. The testes are descended and free of masses. Pubic hair is present in a normal distribution. Ano-genital trauma is not present and the buttocks and anus are otherwise unremarkable

On the posterior torso there is a well-healed vertical $3 \times \frac{1}{4}$ -inch scar in the midline over the thoracic spine. There is a 3×2 -inch vertical scar in the midline of the lumbar spine. A well-healed $3-x \frac{1}{4}$ -inch irregularly shaped scar is on the left lower back. A vertical $\frac{1}{4} \times \frac{1}{4}$ -inch scar is on the upper aspect of the right buttock. A $1 \times \frac{1}{4}$ -inch vertical scar is present on the left buttock. There is an oblique $3 \times \frac{1}{4}$ -inch scar on the lower aspect of the left buttock. Injuries to the torso will be described below in the "evidence of injuries" section.

The upper and lower extremities are symmetric without clubbing or edema. Injuries to the palms of the hands and soles of the feet are not noted. There is a vertical 6 x ¼-inch scar on the medial aspect of the distal left thigh, which extends to the upper left leg. On the dorsum of the right foot is a 1x ½-inch scar. On the dorsal aspect of the left foot is a 1x ½-inch scar. Injuries to the extremities will be described below in the "evidence of injury section".

RADIOGRAPHS

Postmortem radiographs are obtained and support the clinical diagnoses.

EVIDENCE OF INJURY

I. BLUNT FORCE INJURIES:

A. Head and Neck:

Externally, a circumferential periorbital contusion surrounds the right eye with associated subconjunctival hemorrhage of the eyeball. A 1½ x ¾-inch contusion is on the right side of the face, lateral to right eye. There is a ½ x ¼-inch contusion on the left side of the nose, immediately adjacent to the left medial canthus. A ½ ½-inch round contusion is on the right lower lip. There is a 1 x ½-inch contusion on the buccal mucosa of the lower lip. Reflection of the scalp reveals bilateral subgaleal hemorrhages of the parietal scalp with contusions of the right and left temporalis muscles. Injury to the skull is not identified. The brain and spinal cord are without injury. Incision and layerwise dissection of the anterior and posterior neck demonstrates no injury of the anterior neck and deep paracervical muscular tissues and no cervical spine fractures.

B.Torso:

On the upper lateral aspect of the left side of the chest is a 5×2 -inch contusion. On the upper quadrant of the left side of the abdomen is an oblique 5×1 -inch contusion. Just inferior to this contusion is an oval 3×2 -inch contusion. On the posterior lateral aspect of the left buttock is a 3×1 -inch linear contusion. On the mid aspect of the left buttock is an oval 3×2 -inch contusion.

Internally, there are contusions of the muscles of the upper right and left chest walls. Posteriorly, there are muscle contusions of the right upper back. There are fractures of left anterior ribs three through six and right anterior ribs five and six. There are contusions over the mid aspect of the sternum. The left lung is involved by a 5 x 3-cm contusion of the anterior aspect of the upper lobe of the left lung.

C.Extremities:

On the posterior aspect of the right forearm is a linear 6×2 -inch contusion with a $3 \times 1/4$ -inch abrasion in its center. On the dorsum of the right hand is a 3×2 -inch contusion and smaller contusions overlay the dorsal aspect of the second and third right digits. On the anterior aspect of the left upper arm is a $3/4 \times 1/4$ -inch contusion. This contusion is continuous with the previously described injury on the lateral aspect of the upper left chest. There is a 2×1 -inch contusion on the medial aspect of the left elbow. On the posterior aspect of the left elbow is a 2×2 -inch contusion. There are contusions

overlying the dorsum of the left hand centered over the fourth and fifth metacarpal joints. On the anterior aspect of the right thigh are three linear horizontal contusions. The most proximal contusion measures $3 \times \frac{1}{2}$ -inches. Immediately inferior to this is a $2 \frac{1}{2} \times \frac{1}{2}$ -inch contusion and the most inferior contusion, located at the mid anterior thigh, measures $4 \times \frac{1}{2}$ -inches. A vertical 6×3 -inch contusion is located on the anterior-lateral aspect of the mid right thigh. A 4×3 -inch contused-abrasion overlies the anterior aspect of the right knee. On the anterior mid left thigh is a $1 \frac{1}{2} \times 1$ -inch contusion. The left knee is covered by a 3×1 -inch vertical contused-abrasion. On the anterior aspect of the left leg is a $7 \times 2 \frac{1}{2}$ -inch irregularly shaped contusion. On the posterior aspect of the distal left thigh, in the midline, is a 2×2 -inch oval contusion. On the dorsal aspect of the left foot are $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch oval contusions overlying the second, third, fourth, and fifth metacarpelphalangeal joints.

II. <u>LIGATURE INJURIES</u>:

The wrists and ankles show evidence of binding ligature injuries. On the anterior aspect of the right wrist is a 2 x ½-inch linear horizontal contusion and on the back of the right wrist is 2 x ½-inch linear horizontal contusion. Cut sections into these wounds show hemorrhage into the superficial subcutaneous tissue. On the front of the left wrist on the lateral aspect is a 1 x ¾-inch contusion, extending to the left thumb. On the back of the left wrist is a 2 ½ x ½-inch contusion, which extends across the diameter of the wrist. Cut sections into these wrist wounds show hemorrhage into the superficial aspects of the subcutaneous tissue. On the lateral aspect of the anterior right ankle is a 3 x 3-inch contused-abrasion and on the posterior-lateral aspect of the right ankle is a 2 x 1-inch contused-abrasion. On the anterior aspect of the left ankle is 3 ½ x 1-inch linear contusion extending from the lateral to mid aspect of the left ankle. Incision into these ankle wounds show hemorrhage into the superficial subcutaneous tissue.

III. REMOTE GUNSHOT WOUND OF THE TORSO:

Dissection of the spleen reveals a minimally deformed medium caliber jacketed projectile within the splenic parenchyma. The projectile is surrounded by dense fibrous tissue.

INTERNAL EXAMINATION

HEAD:

Injuries to the subgaleal soft tissues of the scalp have been described. The remainder of the galeal and subgaleal soft tissues are free of injury. The calvarium is intact, as is the dura mater beneath it. Clear cerebrospinal fluid surrounds the 1400 gm brain, which has unremarkable gyri and sulci. Coronal sections demonstrate sharp demarcation between white and grey matter, without hemorrhage or contusive injury. The ventricles are of normal size. The basal ganglia, brainstem, cerebellum, and arterial systems are free of

injury or other abnormalities. There are no skull fractures. The atlanto-occipital joint is stable.

NECK:

The anterior strap muscles of the neck are homogenous and red-brown, without hemorrhage. The thyroid cartilage and hyoid are intact. The larynx is lined by intact white mucosa. The thyroid is symmetric and red-brown, without cystic or nodular change. The tongue is free of bite marks, hemorrhage, or other injuries.

BODY CAVITIES:

Injuries to the chest have been described. The vertebral bodies are visibly and palpably intact. No excess fluid is in the pleural, pericardial, or peritoneal cavities. The organs occupy their usual anatomic positions.

RESPIRATORY SYSTEM:

Injury to the left lung has been described. The right and left lungs weigh 650 and 485 gms, respectively. The uninjured external surfaces are smooth and deep red-purple. The pulmonary parenchyma is diffusely congested and edematous. No mass lesions or areas of consolidation are present.

CARDIOVASCULAR SYSTEM:

The 425 gm heart is contained in an intact pericardial sac. The epicardial surface is smooth, with minimal fat investment. The coronary arteries are present in a normal distribution, with a right-dominant pattern. Cross sections of the vessels show no significant atherosclerosis. There is 30% stenosis of the proximal left anterior descending coronary artery. Otherwise, the remaining coronary arteries are widely patent. The myocardium is homogenous, red-brown, and firm. The valve leaflets are thin and mobile. The walls of the left and right ventricles are 1.4 and 0.4-cm thick, respectively. The endocardium is smooth and glistening. The aorta gives rise to three intact and patent arch vessels. The renal and mesenteric vessels are unremarkable.

LIVER & BILIARY SYSTEM:

The 1500 gm liver has an intact, smooth capsule and a sharp anterior border. The parenchyma is tan-brown and congested, with the usual lobular architecture. No mass lesions or other abnormalities are seen. The gallbladder contains 10 cc of green-black bile and no stones. The mucosal surface is green and velvety. The extrahepatic biliary tree is patent.

SPLEEN:

Recovery of a remote projectile has been discussed. The 130 gm spleen has a smooth, intact, red-purple capsule. The parenchyma is maroon and congested, with distinct Malpighian corpuscles.

PANCREAS:

The pancreas is firm and yellow-tan, with the usual lobular architecture. No mass lesions or other abnormalities are seen.

ADRENALS:

The right and left adrenal glands are symmetric, with yellow cortices and grey medullae. No masses or areas of hemorrhage are identified.

GENITOURINARY SYSTEM:

The right and left kidneys weigh 115 and 120 grns, respectively. The external surfaces are intact and smooth. The cut surfaces are red-tan and congested, with uniformly thick cortices and sharp corticomedullary junctions. The pelves are unremarkable and the ureters are normal in course and caliber. White bladder mucosa overlies an intact bladder wall. The bladder contains approximately 300 cc of yellow urine. The prostate is normal in size, with lobular, yellow-tan parenchyma. The seminal vesicles are unremarkable. The testes are free of mass lesions, contusions, or other abnormalities.

GASTROINTESTINAL TRACT:

The esophagus is intact and lined by smooth, grey-white mucosa. The stomach contains approximately 200 cc of dark brown partially digested food. The gastric wall is intact. The duodenum, loops of small bowel, and colon are unremarkable. The appendix is present.

want to make the following statement under oath: on 4 NOV 03, I was assigned as the runner of tier 1B of the "hardsite" at Abu Ghraib Prison. My shift on this date was from 0400 hrs to 1600 hrs. My duties as the runner are to perform miscellaneous tasks such as getting chow for the other MPs, relieving others for breaks etc. At approximately 0430-0500 hrs, a person from OGA came to the office located near the intake point of tier 4B and advised me that they had a prisoner. I unlocked the door to the intake point and two OGA personnel, an interrogator and a translator, walked the prisoner into tier 4B. They placed the prisoner in a holding cell. I had seen the translator on two to three prior occasions at the prison but I had never before seen the interrogator. The prisoner had a green plastic sandbag over his head and was wearing only a purple jacket and purple T-shirt. The prisoner was not wearing any pants, underwear, shoes, or socks. His hands were secured behind his back with flex cuffs. The flex cuffs were very tight on his wrists because I later had trouble cutting them off. The prisoner did not appear to be in distress. He was walking fine and his speech was normal. SSG and SGT were in and out of the area when the prisoner was brought in. Within minutes of placing the prisoner in the holding cell, the translator and interrogator began to yell at him. They were yelling at the prisoner trying to find where some weapons were. The prisoner was responding to the yelled questions in Arabic but I could not understand what he was saying. The door to the holding cell was open and SSG and myself were standing outside while this was going on. I could see the prisoner in the corner of the cell in a seated position like a scared child with the translator and interrogator leaning over him yelling at him. They yelled at the prisoner for 5-10 minutes and then they asked SSG and myself to remove the flex cuffs. We removed the flex cuffs and the two OGA personnel removed the prisoner's jacket and shirt. They again

began to yell at the prisoner about the weapons at which point SSG and myself backed out of the cell. The OGA personnel then advised SSG and myself to "take the prisoner to tier one." Upon this request we placed the prisoner in an orange jumpsuit, handcuffed his hands behind his back and shackled his feet. We used steel handcuffs and shackles to secure the prisoner. At this time I did not see any injuries on the prisoner.

There was no bruising, swelling or blood. If we had seen any injuries on the prisoner at this time we would have called for a medic. It is common procedure to clothe, handcuff, and shackle a prisoner when brought in by OGA. After this, SSG and I walked the prisoner to the shower room on tier 1B. The prisoner offered no resistance while we escorted him. The OGA personnel followed behind us. The interrogator told us that he did not want the prisoner to sit down and wanted him shackled to the wall. I got some leg irons and shackled the prisoner to the wall by attaching one end of the leg irons to the bars on the window and the other end to the prisoner's handcuffs. In this position the prisoner could stand without any discomfort. It is possible that SPC also present in the shower room when we secured the prisoner but I am not certain. Once he was shackled to the wall, SSG and I left the room and the OGA personnel started their interrogation. I left the area and returned to the MP office. At this point it had been approximately 30 minutes since the OGA personnel had arrived at the facility. I left the prisoner with the interrogators prior to 0530 hrs. At about 0700 hrs, SGT came to the office and stated the prisoner had died. SSG was present when SGT told me to go to the tier and find out if the made this announcement. SSG prisoner was really dead. Upon my arrival at the tier, I looked through the open door to the shower room and saw the prisoner was no longer shackled to the wall. From my position outside the shower room, I could only see the prisoner's head and shoulders. The prisoner was laying face up on the floor and I could see he had facial injuries consisting of a swollen and bruised eye and also bruising at various locations on his face. I don't recall seeing blood on his face. It was apparent to me that the prisoner was dead. I called on the radio and told him the prisoner was dead. SSG asked me what they were going to do with the body. I tried to find out what the OGA was going to do with the body from the interrogator and interpreter. Shortly after this, 4-5 more OGA personnel appeared at the scene. There was confusion about what to do with the body of responded to my location. He then directed me to return to the prisoner so SSG the office and answer the telephone. SSG eventually returned to the office, telephoned battalion personnel and tried to determine who was going to take the body. Later in the day, someone, I don't know who, made the decision to place the prisoner in a body bag. I had also heard over the radio that an MP was requesting ice to put on the body because he was starting to smell. I then went to various locations looking for ice. Before I found any ice someone else had found some and placed it on the body to stop it from smelling. Later in the day, at an unknown time, I was on tier 1B near the shower room. Said he later saw that the man had been severely beaten on his face.

Intelligence officers took the detainee to a shower room used for interrogations, said, and shackled him to a wall. "About an hour later, he died on them," testified. "They decided to put him on ice. There was a battle between [OGA] and MI [military intelligence] as to who was going to take care of the body. A couple days later, he was finally disposed of."

Testifying at a hearing for one of the seven accused members of his unit, the 372nd Military Police Company, Capt. said that one night in November 2003, he saw the bloodied body of an Iraqi prisoner who had died during interrogation inside a shower stall in a prison cellblock. He said a number of officers were standing around it, discussing what to do.

One of them, he said, was Colonel the military intelligence at the prison. "I heard Colonel say, 'I'm not going to go down alone for this,' " Captain say estified.

An autopsy the next day established the cause of death as a blood clot from trauma, he said.

The hearing was for Specialist 26, of Alexandria, Va., who appears in some of the photographs of the prisoner abuse at Abu Ghraib showing a human pyramid of detainees. Specialist also appears in a photograph with the dead detainee referred to in Captain estimony, his body packed in ice. Captain estified that the detainee had been captured during a firefight and had died during his interrogation. "He died in the shower," Captain said. "I was told that when he was brought in he was combative, that they took him up to the room and during the interrogation he passed."

The body was left locked in the shower overnight. The next day an intravenous drip was fitted to it and it was taken away. "I was told the reason they did that was they didn't want the other inmates to get upset he had passed during the interrogation," he said. He said he was told the body "was taken to Baghdad somewhere."

Military guards took the prisoner to a shower room at the prison, which was used as a temporary interrogation center, according to the account by Specialist Management also of the 372nd Military Police Company.

"He went into the shower for interrogation and about an hour later he died on them," said Specialist whose account left unclear whether the detainee had been examined by a doctor or given any medical treatment before he died.

Captain testimony added further details. He said that when Colonel and the other officers were gathered around the body, a man he identified only as ordered a lower-ranking officer "to get some ice out of the chow hall" to store the body.

"and Colonel were "talking about the situation" and the "O.G.A. guys were visibly upset this had happened." Captain said the incident occurred after an attack on the International Committee of the Red Cross in Baghdad. Meshing with other accounts, he said the detainee had been brought in alive by Navy Seals. Captain said the detainee was one of three men captured; the other two had been killed in the fighting.

In his testimony, Captain described the generally abusive atmosphere at the prison. On his first day there, he said, he noticed Iraqi inmates with underwear on their heads. Another inmate, he said, was wearing a plastic food container as underwear.

"He'd made it himself, I guess, to cover him," Captain said. "That was one of the things that struck me as odd."

Under cross-examination, he said that some inmates at Abu Ghraib whom he described as "psychological patients," had eaten their own feces. Some prisoners wore women's underwear, he said, only because there were not enough men's briefs to go around.

New charges, he said, could be refiled when the reports were completed.
The judge's remarks came on the first of two days of preliminary hearings at the U.S. military base here for four soldiers charged with conspiracy, cruelty, maltreatment and other offenses. The soldiers are Spc. Staff Sgt. Sgt. Sgt. Sgt. Shand who is often described by investigators as the ringleader of the alleged criminal actions. They each face possible court-martial.

Some Abu Ghraib Abuses Are Traced To Afghanistan



WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 - Some of the aggressive tactics used by American military interrogators at Abu Ghraib prison now appear to have had their origins in shadowy corners of the campaign against terrorism, following interrogation techniques developed by Special Operations forces and the Central Intelligence Agency.

Both of the Pentagon investigations made public this week found that the practices of elite secretive forces contributed to the abuses at Abu Ghraib. The belief that "other governmental agencies were conducting interrogations using harsher techniques than allowed" under Army rules fostered "the belief that such methods were condoned," according to the report released on Tuesday by the panel headed by

The report released on Wednesday by Maj. Gen. said a flouting of military procedures by C.I.A. officers who had conducted interrogations inside the prison had "eroded the necessity in the minds of soldiers and civilians for them to follow Army rules."

The suggestion that the agency's practices were in part responsible for what went wrong at Abu Ghraib has reinforced a clash of cultures between the by-the-books Army and the C.I.A, which is known to operate by its own rules. A C.I.A. spokesman, complained Wednesday that the "broad allegations" against the agency were "not supported" by the material in the Report.

General and other senior officers said the C.I.A. had not shared all of the information they had requested as part of their investigation, but Mr. Said the C.I.A. was conducting its own "thorough" inquiry into the conduct of the agency's employees at Abu Ghraib and elsewhere in Iraq.

More broadly, the and a property have provided the clearest assertion to date that the origins of some of the harsh interrogation procedures used at Abu Ghraib rested in those drawn up for use in Afghanistan, most specifically in a document prepared by Special Operations forces in February 2003 that allowed interrogators much more latitude than the rules later put into effect in Iraq.

That document became the template, the reports said, for the unauthorized practices of interrogators at Abu Ghraib from a unit of 519th Military Intelligence Battalion, which had worked closely with paramilitary forces in Afghanistan and was assigned to the 205th Military Intelligence Brigade in Iraq.

But the reports provided no indication of exactly what was contained in that document, and sections of the Report that appeared to describe those practices in further detail were deleted from the version made public on Wednesday.

The details of C.I.A. interrogation practices at Abu Ghraib and elsewhere also remain secret, and were not spelled out in either of the Pentagon reports this week. But government officials have acknowledged that those the agency has used at times in the past on a small number of Qaeda prisoners held at secret detention centers around the world are harsher than those permitted by the military, and have in some cases included techniques like "water boarding," in which a prisoner is made to believe that he will drown.

The three generals investigating the abuses at Abu Ghraib prison determined that six civilian contract employees participated in or failed to report abuse of prisoners, and they referred those individuals to the Justice Department for prosecution.

The employees worked for CACI International Inc., of Arlington, which provided interrogators at the prison, and Titan Corp., which provided translators. The report, which also said the Army failed to properly monitor contractors, provided the clearest view yet of the role contractors played in the prison abuses.

The report alleged that CACI interrogators used dogs to scare prisoners, placed detainees in unauthorized "stress positions" and encouraged soldiers to abuse prisoners at Abu Ghraib. Titan employees hit detainees and stood by while soldiers physically abused prisoners, according to the report.

"The use of contract interrogators and linguists at Abu Ghraib was problematie . . . from a variety of perspectives," the report said. The military was "unprepared for the arrival of contract interrogators and had no training to fall back on in the management, control, and discipline of these personnel."

The investigation found that about half of CACI's interrogators were not properly trained and that the military officer in charge of interrogations did not screen them before allowing them to conduct interrogations. In some cases, CACI interrogators supervised military personnel, which the company has said they were not authorized to do.

Investigators referred four contract employees to the Justice Department after finding they contributed to the abuse and two others for failing to report it.

The report, however, raised questions about how some contractors could be prosecuted. The CACI contract was managed by the Department of Interior. The report said that companies working under contracts not issued by the Defense Department may not be subject to the Military Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Act, which says military contractors are subject to criminal prosecution when operating outside the country if they are accompanying the armed forces.

CACI said in a statement that it is cooperating with the investigation and reviewing the report. "We regret that any CACI personnel are alleged to have engaged in inappropriate behavior."

But the Report does describe a case in which a C.I.A. officer working at Abu Ghraib brandished a loaded weapon in an interrogation room, in violation of military rules.

It says Lt. Intelligence officials have said they suspended that practice last January, but defended it as sometimes appropriate temporarily, to prevent news from circulating about the capture of individuals with particular intelligence value.

Mr. Same of the C.I.A said: "We don't take issue with the report's conclusion that military personnel were confused regarding the role and authorities of different government entities. Better prior consultations, including memorandums of understanding and clearer guidance, would have provided a better guide to the military personnel on duty."

Intelligence officials said the C.I.A.'s inspector general was already carrying out a series of investigations of the agency's involvement in alleged abuses in Iraq, including the handling of the "ghost detainees."

Among the cases under investigation is a previously disclosed episode in November 2003 involving the death of an Iraqi detainee who was taken to Abu Ghraib by C.I.A. officers and whose body was wrapped in plastic and packed in ice before being removed. The prisoner, identified in the report only as Detainee—had been captured by a Navy Seal team and had been injured when struck on the head with the butt of the rifle by a Seal, the Report said.

Intelligence officials have long said they believed that members of the military, not the C.I.A. employees, bore responsibility for the prisoner's death, and the Report said an autopsy conducted later had concluded that the prisoner had "died of a blood clot in the head, likely as a result of injuries he sustained during apprehension."




