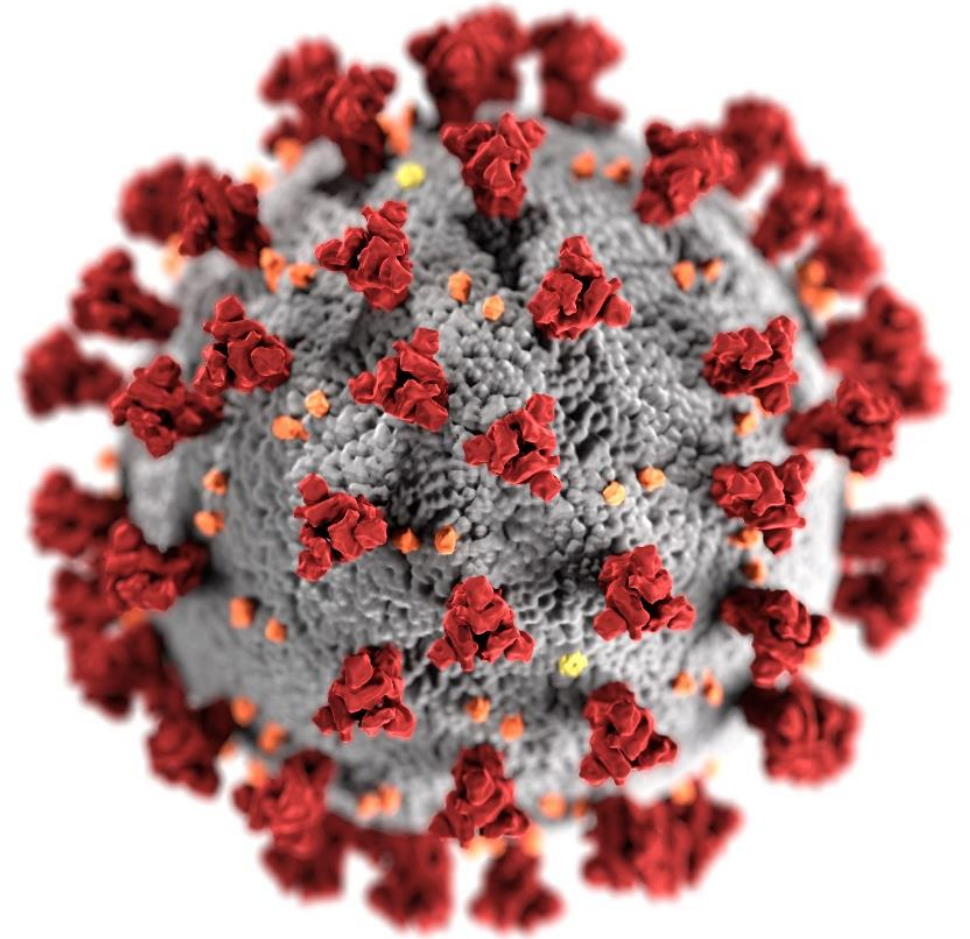

COVID-19 vaccine update:

Bivalent booster authorizations extended to children ages 5+ years

- October 12, 2022: FDA granted emergency use authorization (EUA) for:
 - Use of Moderna bivalent COVID-19 vaccine boosters in children ages 6–17 years
 - Use of Pfizer-BioNTech bivalent COVID-19 vaccine boosters in children ages 5–11 years
- Also on October 12, 2022: CDC recommended use of updated (bivalent) COVID-19 boosters in people ages 5 years and older

COVID-19 vaccine Work Group activities

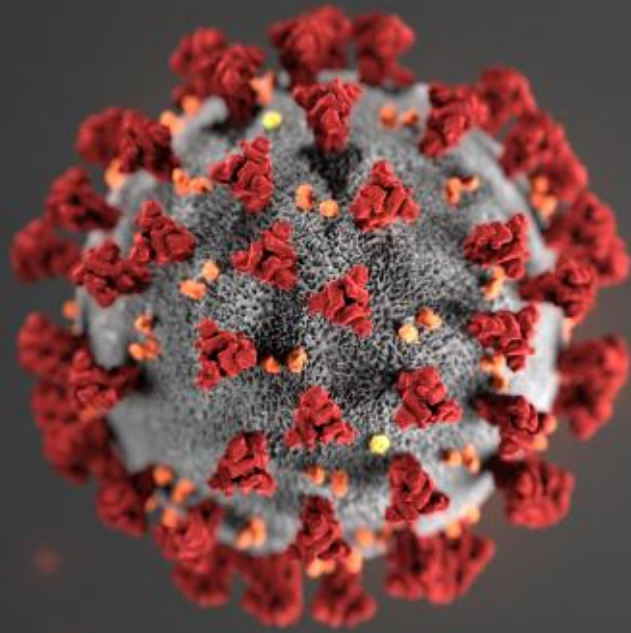
