U.S. to Close Navy Yard; \$1 Billion Loss Seen Here

'Appalled and Surprised' At Hoover Blast, King Says

United Press International ATLANTA, Nov. 19—Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. told FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover today that he was "appalled and surprised" at Hoover's attack on the Negro integration leader.

King sent a telegram to Hoover from Bimini in the Bahamas where he is preparing his acceptance address for the Nobel Peace Prize. Dr. King's Atlanta office made the text public.

Dr. King reacted strongly to Hoover's statement to a group of women in Washington that the integration leader was "the most notorious liar in the country" for alleging the FBI had not done its proper job in Albany, Ga., racial incidents.

Dr. King accused Hoover of "maligning my integrity" and added: "What motivated such an irresponsible accusation is a mystery to me."

Effectiveness Questioned Dr. King acknowledged that he has "sincerely questioned" effectiveness of the FBI in racial incidents, "particularly where bombings and brutality against Negroes are at issue."

King said, however, that he had never attributed this merely to the presence of Southerners in the FBI.

"This is part of the broader question of federal involvement in the protection of Negroes in the South and the seeming inability to gain convictions in even the most heinous crimes perpetrated against civil rights workers."

'Extreme Pressure' In a separate statement released with the telegram, King said

"I cannot conceive of Mr. Hoover making a statement like this without being under extreme pressure. He has apparently faltered under the awesome burdens, complexities and responsibilities of his office."

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Oswald's Widow In Dallas Hospital For 'Observation'

Associated Press DALLAS, Nov. 19—Marina Oswald, widow of President Kennedy's accused assassin, has been admitted to a hospital here and her doctor said no diagnosis of her illness has been made.

The young, Russian-born Mrs. Oswald entered the hospital yesterday after complaining of stomach pains.

Dr. Robert Bishop, her physician, said, "she has no diagnosis and is resting comfortably. She will probably be in the hospital for a few days. No surgery is anticipated."

The hospital's official statement said the slender blonde was "here under observation."

Mrs. Oswald, whose husband, Lee Harvey Oswald, is accused of shooting President John F. Kennedy in Dallas last Nov. 22 and was slain himself by Jack Ruby two days later, lives in suburban Richardson.

DeClan Ford, her business manager, said her two children were staying out of town during Marina's hospitalization.

Ford said he saw Mrs. Oswald at her home yesterday and she appeared "rundown and kind of thin." Nevertheless, he said, she "looked all right."

Ford said Marina told him that her doctor advised her to enter the hospital yesterday.

Earlier this week, a person who knows Mrs. Oswald fairly well said Marina is "a good and well-balanced person, holding up reasonably well."

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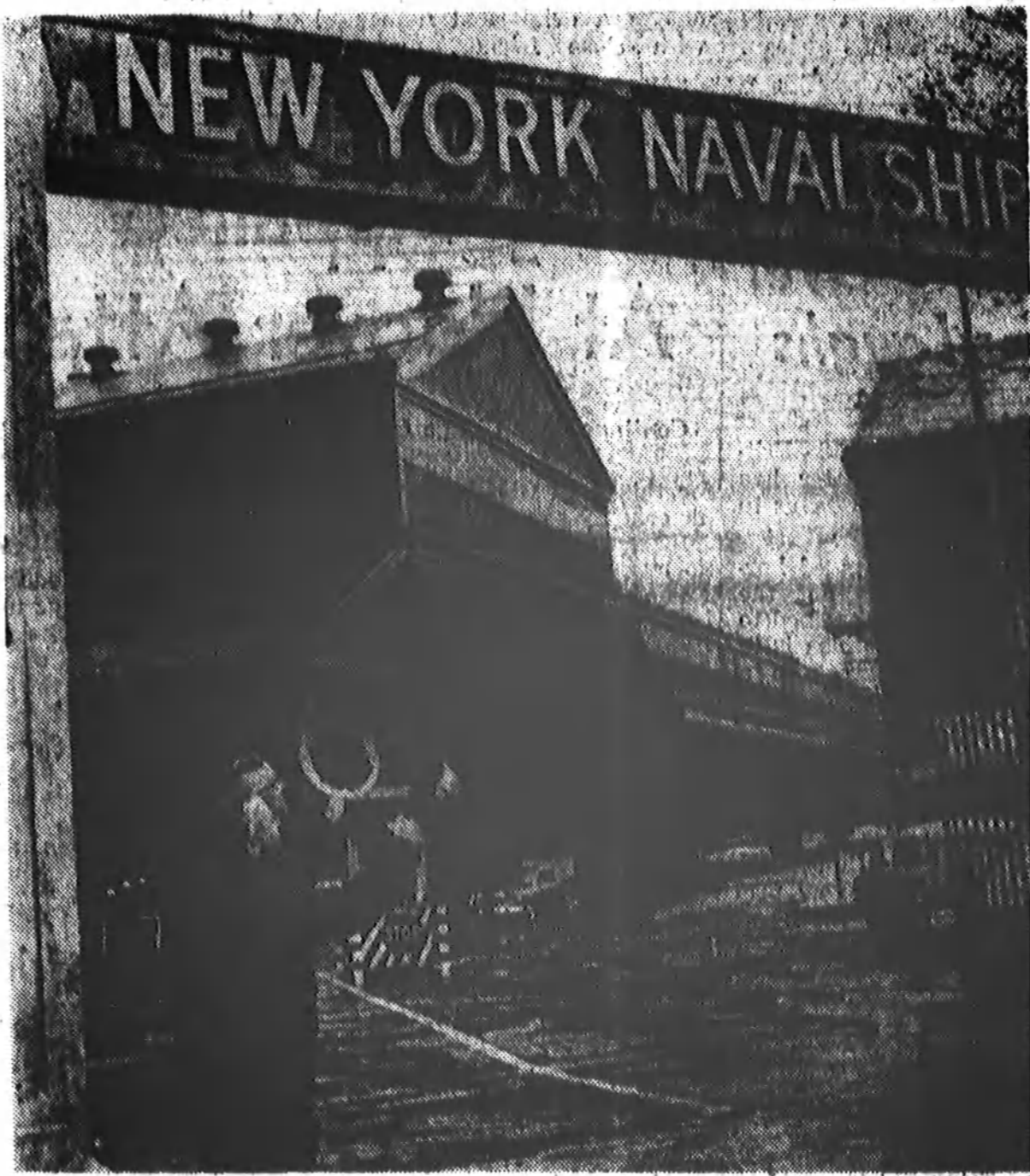

Murphy Slams Door On Jersey City Police

An angry Police Commissioner Michael J. Murphy today broke off relations with Jersey City Police Department.

Murphy blasted the Jersey City force for refusing to cooperate with the New York City authorities and declared:

"Pending clarification of this apparent lack of cooperation, all our facilities are denied to your department."

Jersey City normally is permitted to use the facilities of the New York City Police Department's ballistics bureau, police laboratory, police academy and bureau of criminal identification.

In a letter to the Jersey City police, Murphy said his action was precipitated by Joseph Smith's order to two New York detectives, a New York state trooper and an agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation "to get the hell out of my city."

Adding insult to injury, Murphy declared, Smith ordered his own uniformed patrolmen "to escort the New York car to the Holland Tunnel" to make sure the visitors got out of town.

It all came about, Deputy Commissioner Walter Arm disclosed, while the visiting law enforcement officers were watching the funeral home where the body of waterfront hoodlum Cornelius J. Noonan reposed.

Murphy lodged his blistering complaint with Alfred Suminski, director of Jersey City police and firemen. Murphy's letter included a description of what happened from Deputy Inspector Arthur C. Grubert.

Grubert told Murphy that police here notified Jersey City headquarters that they would be near the Maritan

Funeral Home at 659 Jersey Ave. between 8:30 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Tuesday.

Murphy's letter said that while the two detectives, the FBI agent and the state trooper were sitting in their car, a uniformed Jersey City policeman came over and demanded that they identify themselves, which they did.

A short time later, Murphy said, Chief Smith showed up and, "using nasty and profane language, ordered the quartet of policemen to 'get the hell out of my city.'"

Neither Suminski nor Smith could be reached for comment.

Cutback Dooms 3 Other N.Y. Bases

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 — The closing of the Brooklyn Navy Yard, Fort Jay on Governors Island, the Brooklyn Army Terminal and a Navy training center on Long Island was ordered today by the Department of Defense.

The announcement carried no termination date for operations at the Navy Yard, but the Brooklyn Army Terminal was ordered shut by January, 1967; Fort Jay by July, 1966, and the Naval Training Device Center in Port Washington by July, 1967.

City Comptroller Abraham D. Beame said the shutdown orders would wipe out \$1.25 billion worth of local trade, "sending many small businesses into bankruptcy, wiping out many thousands of additional jobs and thus adding more to local and federal burdens."

'False Economy' He branded Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's moves "short-sighted" and "false economy."

Although the department furnished no termination date for Navy Yard operations, past experience indicates that it would take at least two years.

The yard employs between 9,000 and 10,000 workers. Some 4,000 more are employed at the Brooklyn Army Terminal. The department said 18,400 persons would lose their jobs in the metropolitan area.

In addition, the Defense Department announced a 10-year phaseout of the oldest shipyard in the nation, in Portsmouth, N. H.

The shutdown of the Navy Yard will come despite the efforts of Sen.-elect Robert F. Kennedy, Mayor Robert F. Wagner and other prominent political figures to dissuade Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara, who announced yesterday plans to close 95 military installations employing 63,000 persons in 33 states.

Only two weeks ago, Kennedy appealed for continued operation of the yard in a conference with McNamara, whom he talked with before the election.

After the meeting, McNamara promised there would be no layoffs at the yard for the rest of the year.

Celler Raps Move Rep. Emmanuel Celler (D., N.Y.) issued a statement blasting the "summary way" in which the Defense Secretary announced the closings without again conferring with Congressmen, as Celler said McNamara had promised.

"We were told that before any action was taken, we were to be given an opportunity to make comment," Celler asserted. "This opportunity has not been offered us."

At the same time as the closings in New York and Portsmouth were disclosed, two Virginia Congressmen said no major naval installations in Norfolk, Portsmouth, Va., or Virginia Beach were on the Defense Department list of doomed facilities.

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Kennedy Calls for Yard Study

Sen.-elect Robert F. Kennedy today called for establishment of a committee "with public and private members" to review the closing of the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

Kennedy said the burden of proving that the sprawling yard should be closed "is on those advocating this drastic step."

He added that the proposed panel could evaluate the military needs and the costs of the yard.

Cites Poverty War Kennedy also was critical of the effect of the shutdown on the administration's war against poverty. He said it was foolish to discuss an anti-poverty campaign "when he cut loose thousands of workers from the jobs."

Kennedy said he was "disturbed" because the closing was made "on the basis of limited evidence."

The former Attorney General last week discussed the Navy Yard with Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, Sen. Jacob K. Javits and Mayor Robert F. Wagner.

Mayor to Fight In Paris, Javits said he considered the closing of the base "a disaster to the economy of New York."

At City Hall, Wagner declared the city would keep fighting to save the yard.

Wagner said he would arrange a meeting with the state's Congressional delegation "to see what steps we can take so that the yard is kept open."

He added that he wanted an opportunity to study a report McNamara prepared on the cost to the federal government of maintaining the base. "They said we would have an opportunity to answer the report," he said. "We haven't had that yet."

The Mayor said the city also was distressed by the planned shutdowns of Fort Jay and the Brooklyn Army Terminal.

Brooklyn Borough President Abe Stark described the closing of the Navy Yard as a "tremendous injustice."
