A NEW BOATHOUSE IS POSSIBLE



The new Lindsay Boathouse in Toronto's Outer Harbour — made possible by generous donors including a lead gift by former rower Don Lindsay '76 — will impact more than just the UCC rowers. The boathouse will also host a community learn-to-row program that will operate through the UCC Summer Day Camps framework, and will allow approximately 60 per cent of campers to attend at no cost.

"Broadening the availability of the boathouse to include people who otherwise wouldn't have a chance to row is fantastic," says Lindsay. "For some of them, it will actually change their lives and the trajectory they're on."

Donating to the boathouse was an easy decision for Lindsay. "I think it's important to give back, and the boathouse is a good investment. The students who use it are going to learn things that will stand them in good stead throughout the rest of their lives."

For parents and donors Andrew '91 and Cheryl Guilfoyle, rowing has been a large part of their UCC experience as sons Jack '23, Charlie '24 and William '26 all row for UCC. "For us, it's important to give back to a community that has given our sons—and us—so much over the years."







Eeping curricular innovation and transformational learning top of mind helps Jordan Small think about the way he's engaging with students in his English classes. "In a class of 20 students, for example, there will be 20 diverse learners with different styles and needs," Small says. "Representation matters, and students are always ahead of us in their flexibility and open-minded approaches to learning."

UCC's best-in-Canada financial assistance (FA) program enhances learning for every student—it ensures that we welcome the very best students and that our classrooms are filled with a wide breadth of experiences and perspectives. Today, more than 200 students receive financial assistance, funded in part by our generous donor community.

Says faculty member Heather Crawford, "When teaching literature, I encourage students to contribute to our shared knowledge by drawing from their own cultures, beliefs and experiences. These various perspectives lead to stimulating and enlightening discussions."

UCC is committed to strengthening FA through opportunities such as our class fund program. It's a purpose the Class of 1971 believes in — their class gift receives annual donations from participating members. This funding allows UCC to welcome the best and brightest students regardless of their financial circumstances. Having a community of students with a wide variety of world views, experiences and talents impacts social learning as well.

"The people you spend time with is important," says donor David Hadden '71, "because there is a powerful impact by your peers on your attitude and outlook on the world."

A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE IS POSSIBLE

he College's commitment to sustainability involves encouraging students to take action. From the Eco-warriors club at the Prep to the Sustainability Council at the Upper School, there are multiple ways to get involved and create change.

A generous donation from Andy Chisholm '77 and Laurie Thomson allowed the College to partner with Avéole — a company that provides schools with nature-based solutions — to install a beehive and two bee hotels on the campus last spring. The joint venture also included John Sweetman, director of community service, CAS and clubs, Lynda Yearwood, design and computer science teacher in the Upper School and Sarah Fleming, head of the Prep. The collective hopes to unite the Prep and Upper schools with sustainability programming and activities.

There are already plans for this school year surrounding the hives that allow for students with a range of interests to take part. "The idea is to offer continuous learning related to the hive and the hotels," says Sweetman. "We'll reach out to the sustainability community to see if anyone is interested in learning to become a beekeeper through the Ontario Beekeepers' Association workshops." Yearwood and the design staff are already thinking about incorporating the bees into real-world projects, asking the students to design additional bee hotels that can be placed around campus, and designing a label for the 100 jars of honey that come with the hive installation. Year 2 and 3 students at the Prep got in on the action with an All About Bees afterschool program that ran last spring.

Says Sweetman, "There are lots of opportunities to bring everyone together to learn and step forward in our environmental stewardship of our campus."








A t UCC, we're dedicated to investing in spaces that offer students and faculty the best possible environment for excellence, innovation, and best practices in teaching and learning.

The Science and Languages Wing at the Upper School is designed with intention, informed by values and driven by needs. The renovation of the space created a home for design, tech and language classrooms as well as modular spaces for students to gather. Classrooms encourage exploration and discovery, and can be moulded to the needs of an everchanging learning atmosphere. "We want our students to have more interdisciplinary learning experiences," says Academic Dean Dr. Julia Kinnear. "We want to break down disciplinary silos because by integrating the perspectives, methods and approaches of multiple disciplines, they will be able to solve complex problems in ways that could not be foreseen through the lens of a single discipline. This space not only enables but also supports those objectives."

At the Prep, the Holmes Lab was a pioneering space in the area of design and design thinking. And it continues to be muchused, allowing students to maximize technology and apply it to other areas of learning. "I've been so impressed by how many teachers at UCC are interested in tech applications to the classroom," says Frank Holmes, a past parent and lead donor to the Holmes Family Lab.

"This started as a small project for me, and the College has turned it into something much more. I get a lot of satisfaction knowing that students are having fun learning."

The Upper Canada College Foundation is investing in UCC's next century of growth, exploration and excellence.

Established in 1962 after emergency funds were needed for renovations, the Foundation now exists to manage the College's endowment of \$106 million, and is governed by its 11-member Board of Trustees.

With a long history of generous donors, the Foundation presents an opportunity for those who want to make a gift that will help the school for decades to come. It provides funding towards the College's sector-leading financial assistance program, which sees 20 per cent of students receiving support. Other priorities include the Horizons inter-school tutoring and mentoring program, the Wernham West Centre for Learning, co-curriculars and a breadth of special initiatives.

An endowed gift is a gift that keeps on giving, year over year, to a specific area of need — and as the vehicle for endowed gifts, the UCC Foundation is a best-in-class example of how to responsibly and thoughtfully manage an endowment for stable returns over many generations.
