

500 MORE QUIT SUBWAY WORK ON BOULEVARD

General Strike Call Order Issued Today; 72 Walk Out in Jamaica

More than 500 men employed on the Queens boulevard line of the Independent Subway system responded to a general strike call this morning in sympathy with the striking electricians, according to Harry Van Arsdale of Ozone Park, business agent of the Electrical Workers Union, Local 3.

According to the Board of Transportation, 72 men employed by the William Kennedy Corporation, which has a \$535,000 contract for the construction of the Jamaica yard extension shed, have joined the strike. Five plumbers, six helpers, six bricklayers and helpers and six chauffeurs are remaining on the job.

Thirteen trades are involved in the general strike call. The trades are sheet metal workers, concrete workers, concrete finishers, carpenters, plumbers, steam fitters, excavating laborers, stationary engineers, metal workers, composition roofers, stone-cutters, glaziers and painters.

A general strike is already in force in the other units of the subway system. The strike in Queens is holding up construction from Jackson Heights to 178th street, Jamaica. Union officials estimate that over 800 men are now out on strike in this borough.

The electrical workers charge that the General Railway Signal Company, in charge of installing the signal work, are paying their men below the union scale and are also employing men from out-of-town.

Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg, Regional NRA Director, is holding a hearing today on the charges. Union officials this morning said that if no satisfactory agreement is reached they might call out the general strike of all construction workers on PWA projects in the metropolitan area tomorrow.

This move would tie up the Tri-Boro Bridge, the Queensboro General Hospital in Jamaica, and BaySide High School.

Officials of the Board of Transportation said today that "the much heralded sympathetic walkout by organized labor on the 18 contracts jobs for completion of unfinished portions of the city new subway system did not materialize."

Jerome Daly, secretary of the Board, said that out of 974 workmen

"Forty-seven of these are electrical workers who have been out for the past ten days and 70 others in various crafts walked out at the Jamaica storage yard job. On that job there is a total of 95 workmen divided among 18 crafts. Only 70 of the 95 failed to report for work today."

In the meantime building service employees, whose recent strike was settled by arbitration, have threatened to call a new strike Friday according to James J. Bambrick of Ozone Park, president of the Building Service Employees Union.

Bambrick charges that the Realty Advisory Board is attempting to violate the agreement by advising building owners to show prejudice against union workers.

Bambrick estimates that the new strike would involve 7,000 buildings and 55,000 employees in Manhattan.

of Rockaway Park and Lenihan were close friends. Since Brunner began to take an active role in politics about 14 years ago, he and Lenihan were frequently seen together. They usually appeared at political affairs together.

Former Alderman John T. O'Connell of Jamaica was deeply affected by Mr. Lenihan's death. He said: "I knew him for over 20 years and he was a really fine character. Although I realized that he was extremely ill, I am terribly shocked at his death."

"He was one of the most faithful and hard-working men I ever met. The people in his district certainly will miss him."

Mr. Hoffmann, Assistant District Attorney, said that "it would be hard to find anyone as selfless as Alderman Lenihan. His job really was his whole life."

Entered Trucking Business

Educated at St. John's College, Brooklyn, he entered the trucking business when he finished school. With a natural flair for politics he became increasingly engrossed in the Democratic party. He cast his first vote about the time that Senator Pat McCarran reached his zenith in Brooklyn.

McCarran's belief in party loyalty and in extending practical help to voters in the district helped shape young Lenihan's policies. Moving to Richmond Hill in 1912, the future Alderman immediately plunged into local activities.

Appointed postmaster of the State Senate in 1921, he held the job until 1924, when he was elected Alderman. Surviving are his wife, Mary; a son, Joseph, and a married daughter, Mrs. Margaret Lochner of Richmond Hill. His son, in his early twenties, is an accountant.

Requm mass will be said in the Church of the Holy Child Jesus, Richmond Hill, Friday. Interment will be in St. John's Cemetery.

Lenihan was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Isabella Council; the Queensboro Elks, the Delacassian Boat Club, the Richmond Hill Democratic Club, the Cross Bay Democratic Club, the Regular Democratic Club, the West End Democratic Club, the Oscawana Democratic Club, the Woodhaven Democratic Club, the Whiting Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the Richmond Hill Civic Association.

A member of the Queens County Democratic Committee and leader of the First Zone, Fifth Assembly District, he also belonged to the Yarmouth Democratic Club and the Young Men's Democratic Club of Richmond Hill.

BAIL IS DENIED 3 SEIZED IN RAID

The three men and the woman arrested in a Brooklyn apartment Sunday, suspected of being implicated in last summer's \$428,000 armored car holdup, were held for a hearing Friday when arraigned before Magistrate Blancheheld yesterday in Flatbush Court.

While police were convinced the prisoners had no connection with the daring holdup, one of those arrested, John McGlone, alias John O'Connor, alias "Sunny" Collins, and ex-convict, is wanted by New Jersey authorities as a suspect in a holdup last September in Perth Amboy.

McGlone was charged with being a fugitive from justice, while the other three were charged with harboring a fugitive.

Besides McGlone, those held in the case are James Sullivan, 37, of Lawrence avenue, Lynbrook; Matthew Lynch, 31, and Mrs. Irene Kernan, 28. All were arrested in an apartment at 2111 Beekman place, Brooklyn.

Ball was denied the three men. Mrs. Kernan was held in \$2,000 bail.

Roggerman Attacks Welfare System

3,037 File Sales Tax Returns in Queens

Queens sales tax receipts yesterday amounted to \$198,635, Comptroller Frank J. Taylor announced this morning.

City-wide receipts totaled \$703,159 bringing the total payments to date for the first quarter up to \$8,572,611. The number of returns received yesterday was 8,953, of which 3,037 were from Queens.

Comptroller Taylor had expected the returns to reach the \$10,000,000 mark and is planning an enforcement campaign. He will check the returns against the list of retailers.

Home Relief Garden Work Starts This Week

Work of clearing land for 4,000 subsistence gardens in Queens will start this week, Emergency Relief Bureau officials announced today.

Six plots are available in Queens, with each site containing land for 50 to 100 gardens. Plots of 50 square feet will be allotted to men on Home Relief to raise vegetables for their families. Each man will devote approximately two days a week on the garden, and Commissioner William Hodson of the Department of Public Welfare estimates that each man's share will be \$50 of vegetables.

Planting is scheduled to begin April 15, and planting about May 1. Tools, seeds and other materials will be supplied to the gardeners. Because the majority of men are not trained, experienced farmers will do the planting.

TWO ARE SLAIN IN VENDETTA

HERSHEY, Pa. (INS)—Blazing away with an automatic revolver, Guermir Carlucci, 38, today shot and killed one man, wounded two others and then beat the wife of one of his victims to death.

The dead were: Emidio Giovanetti, 40, and his wife, Laura, also 40. The wounded were Otario Pace and Basilio Martini.

Mrs. Giovanetti was beaten to death with the stock of a shot gun as she sat in the bathtub in her home when the frenzied slayer burst through the door after killing her husband and snatching the shotgun from her hands.

Overpowered, Carlucci was rushed to the state police barracks here under heavy guard.

Officials said they were trying to determine whether the man was insane or whether the mass shooting was the culmination of a blackmail and bootlegging vendetta as he declared.
