

# LOCKER ROOMS AT RIIS PARK MADE LARGER

### Facilities at Queens Beach Playground Extended to Handle Crowds

A modified Jones Beach State Park is to be built by Park Commissioner Moses at Jacob Riis Park, Rockaway Beach, according to plans just approved by the Municipal Art Commission.

A. Everett Peterson, assistant secretary, announced the Art Commission's action last night. The bathing pavilion at Riis Park will be redesigned and enlarged, with locker-room space to accommodate 11,500 bathers instead of 8,500. The principal new structure will be a horseshoe-shaped building at the end of the new mall facing the waterfront to provide an office for the supervisor of the park and space for the concessionaire.

Smaller buildings will include a ticket booth for beach games, golf control booth for the new 18-hole pitch-putt course, a pump house and other utility structures. With the completion of the new bridge over Rockaway Inlet and the new Marine Parkway, the main entrance to the reconditioning park will be near its western end. A series of loops, tunnels and underpasses will speed traffic into the development and through it to the large parking field to be provided.

Slightly to the east of the new parkway entrance will be the main park mall, leading south to the semi-circular, horseshoe-shaped building in the western part of the development. At the end of the mall will stand the new mall building. To the west will be facilities for paddle tennis, shuffleboard and pitch-putt golf, with small buildings to handle tickets. To the east of the mall will be more play areas for handball, paddle tennis, children's play apparatus, shuffleboard and an Indian village.

Further east, along the waterfront, will be more facilities for ping-pong, horseshoe pitching, paddle tennis and shuffleboard. East of the bathhouse will be children's playground. The proposed promenade, consisting mainly of the existing Boardwalk, will extend along the waterfront. North of the recreational areas and the roadway system, extending from the east end of the park almost to the mall, will be

the parking area, which will provide for 5,000 automobiles.

The parking control gate will be just east of the center of the park and an underpass, leading from the parking area east of the control gate, will connect with the bathing pavilion and the adjacent recreational areas. As planned by the Park Department, the new project will eliminate entirely any danger of Riis Park's eventually being developed along the lines of Coney Island.

Preliminary work on the new development already is under way with WPA labor. It was disclosed yesterday, a 4,000-foot seawall is being built as a part of the plan to widen the beach.

Work to be done on the existing bathing pavilion will include a thorough renovation of both exterior and interior. Equipment will be modernized and the concessionaire's space enlarged. Architectural changes will include increasing the height of the towers and installation in them of tide and time clocks, adding new police accommodations and increasing the height of the walk around the open-air dressing rooms.

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# MOVE TO OUST BILL GOODWIN STRIKES SNAG

### Pratt and Mrs. Price Refuse to Aid Regan's Fight on Rosedale Leader

The movement to oust William J. Goodwin as Rosedale Democratic leader, initiated by Deputy Sheriff John E. Regan Wednesday, struck a snag last night as Helena Price, district co-leader, and Assistant U. S. Attorney Robert L. Pratt, Sheridan campaign manager, refused to cooperate.

Mrs. Price and Pratt opposed Goodwin when the latter backed the organization designee, William B. Barry, for Congress. Goodwin was charged by Regan with supporting W. F. Bleakley, Republican gubernatorial candidate in the past election campaign.

Pratt, presiding at a meeting of the Executive Democratic Club of the Third Zone, Fourth Assembly District, last night, refused to entertain a motion to put the club on record against Goodwin's leadership.

The motion was introduced by James Dunne, Regan aid. Pratt said the organization would not join the movement, asserting: "We are anxious to create harmony in the district, not disruption."

Mrs. Price declared: "I feel the Goodwin matter is one for Sheridan to handle. I'm taking no part in it right now." Goodwin interviewed at his home, denied charges he campaigned for Bleakley. "I was on a two-week business trip to Detroit, Chicago, and Nevada until a couple of days before

election," he said. "I wasn't in any position to campaign for Bleakley." Questioned as to whether any of his aids took part in a Bleakley movement, Goodwin replied: "I'm not in any position to speak for anyone but myself. After all, I was away and do not know what was going on in the zone during my absence."

**Answers Regan**  
Referring to Regan's charges that he failed to campaign actively for the other Democratic candidates, Goodwin said: "After the primary fight I told Harry Duckler, executive secretary at Democratic headquarters, that I would support the organization slate in the election. My club and I publicly endorsed the slate, including Barry."

"Duckler told me he would let me know how the organization felt about my leading the campaign in this territory. Later, he declared the party would recognize the organization set up by Pratt and Mrs. Price rather than my own. Under those circumstances, I didn't consider there was any need for my

active participation in the campaign.

The leader charged Regan with being a Sheridan stooge acting under orders from the borough chief. He declared the county leader had violated the rules of the executive committee in failing to restore him as head of the campaign in the zone after the primary fight was over.

"In running for the Democratic congressional nomination independently during the primary I was exercising the privilege given any good Democrat," he said. The or-

ganization could have set up a campaign manager in the primary and then put me back at the helm after the campaign was over."
