

SCHROETER HEADS LEGION RACE

ELECTION SEEN AS CONVENTION DRAWS NEAR

Five-Sided Fight Looms for Vice-Commander; Mayor to Attend

With Fred Schroeter of 41-44 44th street, Long Island City, almost assured of election as commander of the Queens American Legion at its annual convention next week, speculation shifted in Legion circles today to the identity of candidates for the remaining offices.

Opposition to Schroeter who is a former commander of the Edward J. Lange Post, Woodside, has practically disappeared in recent weeks, a poll of Legion leaders indicated last night and it is believed he may be nominated and elected without opposition.

Schroeter's name will be presented to the two-day convention in Woodhaven Saturday night, July 24, when the annual election will be held in P. S. 97, 85th street and 85th road.

Long Active in Post
A member of the Lange Post for 14 years, Schroeter has been county committeeman for 10 years, state delegate five years, national delegate four years, county executive committeeman three years and county vice-commander in 1932.

The identity of all candidates for their offices will not be known until the convention but the poll last night indicated the following candidates are in a strong position.

For vice-commander: John Whitman of Baisley Park Post, William Dooley, Astoria Post, Joseph Capella, Elmhurst Post, Vincent Pastorek, Conna Post, Wilson Caskey, Garly Post.

For reelection as treasurer: William E. Smith of Leonard Post. Arrangements Completed

Final arrangements for the convention which will be held July 23 and 24 in the auditorium of P. S. 97 were made at a meeting last night of the Woodhaven Post Citizens' Committee, of which Thomas Oberlin is chairman.

Mayor La Guardia, Borough President Brunner and a host of other public officials will attend the opening session Friday which will be followed by a reception by the Woodhaven Citizens Committee at Dexter Park. All business of the convention will be conducted on Saturday, including the meeting in the afternoon of the Legion Auxiliary, but in the afternoon a parade with more than 10,000 in line will be held throughout Woodhaven.

The Parade Route
Starting at P. S. 97, the parade will wind along Park Lane south to 102nd street, then along 102nd street to Jamaica avenue, along Jamaica avenue to Dexter Park, where refreshments will be served.

More than 600 delegates from 29 posts, 34 auxiliaries and 34 Sons of the Legion units will attend the convention which has been marked by Borough President Harvey with a proclamation setting aside Saturday, July 24 as Queens American Legion Day.

BARMAN HELD IN ASSAULT \$4,250 PAID CRASH WIDOW

A Rockaway Park innkeeper, Hugh McNulty, 62, of 108-20 Rockaway Beach boulevard, was accused in Felony Court yesterday of using the bartender's traditional weapon, a baseball bat ice-crusher, on a man who claimed to be a former employe.

Nicholas Cullen of Manhattan charged he had to be treated for head wounds yesterday morning, after going in to demand \$80 he said McNulty owed him in back wages.

Magistrate Gustav Wieholdt held McNulty for a hearing July 19 on an assault charge, and denied bail until police can investigate the defendant's record.

For the death of her husband, Morris L. Pulner, in an automobile accident while returning from a fishing trip, Mrs. May Pulner, 23, of 47-38 44th street, Woodside, will receive \$4,250, according to papers filed in Queens Surrogate Court yesterday.

Mrs. Pulner, mother of a 15-month-old baby, was granted permission to accept the money in settlement of a suit she brought in behalf of her husband's estate.

Pulner was fatally injured March 7 when an automobile in which he was riding with Paul and William Boetticher of 160-12 Grand Central parkway hit a culvert and overturned.

CROWDS SET NEW RECORD AT ROCKAWAYS

7,300,000 Visit Beaches in First 11 Days of July

All records for crowds at the Rockaways were shattered during the first 11 days of July. A Joseph Geist, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the Rockaways, said today in announcing that 7,300,000 persons had been at the beach during this period.

"The crowds are the largest ever known in the history of the Rockaways," Geist said. "Last year, it was estimated that the Rockaways throughout the season entertained approximately 20,000,000 persons from Decoration Day to Labor Day. This year, the Rockaways have already surpassed the 10,000,000 mark and from all indications, figures for all previous years will be broken."

Figures on crowds were obtained from police, beach officials and bus and railroad companies, Geist said. During this period, 500,000 attended Riss Park, while the other 6,800,000 were at Neponsit, Belle Harbor, Rockaway Beach, Hammels, Arverne, Edgemere and Far Rockaway.

The peak crowd of the season was reached Sunday when 1,200,000 turned out, 80,000 of them at Riss Park.

Geist said that the opening of the Marine Park Bridge from Brooklyn to the Rockaways was probably the greatest reason for the peak attendance.

With the opening of the bridge, two new bus routes were inaugurated to the Rockaways, one by the Brooklyn Bus Corporation and the other by the Green Bus Lines. The former line starts at Kings highway and Flatbush avenue and the latter at Nostrand and Flatbush avenues, Brooklyn. Both run to Riss Park.

Geist stated that during the nine days from July 3 to July 11 more than 177,000 tolls were collected from automobiles crossing the Marine Parkway Bridge.
