The Cross-Bronx complex includes the proposed Alexander Hamilton Bridge across the Harlem River and the George Washington Bridge Expressway between the Harlem and the Hud-

The Clearview Expressway connects the Throgs Neck Bridge to the long Island Expressway. A 1.7-mile extension to Grand er. Central Parkway is scheduled to be completed in 1963.

Toll booths have already been installed on the Bronx side of the bridge, almost at the end of the 6,000-foot viaduct that gives access to the Cross-Bronx Ex pressway. The toll is 25 cents a

The entire bridge is 2,910 feet long. It is reached from the north by the 6,600-foot viaduct leading from the Cross-Bronx Expressway. Financing of the revenue - producing span was done through the issuance of Triborough Authority bonds.
