Throgs Neck Span May End Tieups At Whitestone Bridge

Bumper-to-bumper traffic tieups on approaches to the Bronx-Whitestone Bridge may soon be only an unpleasant memory.

The scheduled Jan. 11 opening of the new \$90,000,000 Throgs Neck Bridge, which runs parallel to the Bronx-Whitestone two miles north and links the Bronx with the Cryders Point section of Queens, is expected to put an end to the frequent tieups and bring welcome relief to long-suffering motorists.

The impressive Throgs Neck Bridge will provide a major new route for bypassing Manhattan

in traveling to and from Long Island. Simultaneously with the bridge opening, the Triborough Bridge and Tunnel Authority will open the Clearview Expressway into central Queens and the easternmost section of the Cross-Bronx Expressway.

The Cross-Bronx link will carry bridge traffic to and from an interchange at Bruckner Blvd.

When that expressway is fully completed, motorists will be able to travel non-stop from the new span to the George Washington Bridge.

Extension to Parkway

The Cross-Bronx complex includes the proposed Alexander Hamilton Bridge across the Harlem River and the George Washington Bridge Expressway between the Harlem and the Hudson.

The Clearview Expressway connects the Throgs Neck Bridge to the long Island Expressway. A 1.7-mile extension to Grand Central Parkway is scheduled to be completed in 1963.

Toll booths have already been installed on the Bronx side of the bridge, almost at the end of the 6,000-foot viaduct that gives access to the Cross-Bronx Expressway. The toll is 25 cents a car.

The entire bridge is 2,910 feet long. It is reached from the north by the 6,600-foot viaduct leading from the Cross-Bronx Expressway. Financing of the revenue-producing span was done through the issuance of Triborough Authority bonds.

Mayor Wagner will officiate at the ribbon-cutting ceremony Jan. 11 at the Bronx toll plaza.

Ken Carnase Pacing Bronx Pin Efforts

Hottest bowler in The Bronx has been Ken Carnase, just 19, whose average around 210 in the Tremont Bowling Center's Commercial League is the highest in N.Y. City. Ken has been below a 600 series only three times this season in league play.

He missed last out, but the two prior times he led with a 256-666 set an "as a runner up with a 234-617 score. Ron Brassell's 248-682 and Joe Golanek's 234-656 led the other rounds.

Ken, who shot a 500 recently at Fordham Bowl, hasn't left older brother Andy behind. The much laureled veteran shot high game of 269 in second series of 647 one recent round.

Other highlights of recent rounds were Marv Applebaum with 229, 226-645 and 240-640, Bob Miller 225-627, Paul Ficara 220-626, Kid Abel 235 and 227-608, Frank Medici 232 and 222-608, Len Cohen 210-607 and 216-603, Ron Brassell 214-603, Jim De Rasmio 255-600, Richie Ruch 227, Ed Seco 224, Jerry Pagliuca 224, Hy Ustin 222 and 218, Lou Maresco 221, Ed Walsh 211 and Harry Markarian 212.

Besides Carnase, 19, two other young bowlers who squeezed into the spotlight lately have been Ronnie Barron and Harvey Funt, each 17. Funt, averaging 164, won for host Manhattan Lanes the first of 10 monthly Junior Major playoffs including the whiz kids there and at Woodhaven and Bay Ridge Lanes.

Navy-bound Barron, 186 average, rolled a 24-600 set, third high for the Boston Road Classic season. He, Sy Million with 226-635 and Tony Laquidara with 235-633 led Lanes to season-high 3,074 series and second-high 1,109 game totals in duelling Altsacs for the week.

Other recent highs were Larry Lieves with 285-619, Len Cohen 243-683, Artie Nadel's 243-646, Al Levins 234-644, and 245-626, Don Reinertson 222-639, Jim Shiver 237-632, Bill Howes 231-627, Sonny Yoshida 207-617, Jerry May 241-614, Jim Abel 221-613, John Calini 214-610, Bill Holodak a 252, Ai Brafman a 246.

Morty Baum's 210-606 and 244-659, the latter season series high, paced the last two Boston Tuesday rounds. John Seumour had 224-607, Larry Wien 214-604, Ira Lebowitz 224-600, Phil Lader a 246 and Charles Hardy a 224. JB's has been team leader.

Highs the last three rounds of the E. Bronx Protestant Church League at Parkchester Center have been Guss Hergott with 235-569, Ray Barnett with 565, The Rev. Melvin Carrico with a 557, Bob Bishberger a 224 and Gus Sandquist a 222. Parkchester Baptist moved past St. Peter's Episcopal for the team lead, while Tremont Terrace Moravian slipped into third.

Holy Cross' most heralded basketball player this season is junior Jack (The Shot) Foley, but if the Crusaders have another of their fine teams, chances are four Bronxites on the varsity will be partially responsible. They're senior co-captain Tim Shea and juniors Bill Canavan, Ken McClory and Dave Slattery.

Shea, 6-0 Hayes product and All-New England pick, lost to Foley the scoring title he'd won his precocious sophomore season, though he hit just under 50 per cent of his long set and driving shots to run his two-year total to 770 points . . . Accurate McClory, 5-11 All Hallows grad, understudies Shea and is rated by coach Roy Leenig one of his two best defenders.

Canavan, a 6-0 Fordham Prep product who has been nicknamed Boom-Boom, is another backcourt understudy and rated the team's best dribbler. Slattery, 6-3 leaper from Manhattan Prep, sat out last season's second half to bone up on the books, but is expected to see starting or first reserve duty up front this season. Now, however, Holy Cross is running out of Bronx kids, having none on the frosh for the second straight season.

When Bridgeport visits Feb. 11, they bring Bob Khentigan, 5-8 soph guard from The Bronx, rated a fine playmaker, one-handed shooter and defender.

Lone Bronxites on coach Ken Norton's 15th Manhattan basketball varsity are 6-0 seniors Charles Sharkey from Manhattan Prep and Jim Boyle from Tolentine. Dave Curran's fifth freshman edition rosters two others—6-5 Jim Reilly from Tolentine and 6-3 Sanford Lent from Fordham Prep. Reilly's the tallest rookie, but none of 10 carries is under 6-0 . . . Seton Hall's highly-regarded basketball team could wind up this season with two Bronx boys starting. Hank Gunter, 6-7 cornerman from Gonipers, opened as a regular, and Mike Murphy, clever sophomore from Dubols, is expected to wind up an undisputed one when Ken Walker graduates in February.
