Rockaway's perennial argument ever the price of ice seems about to bloom again. Charges of unfair competition already have been made and also a demand that the Commissioner of Markets begin a local investigation.

The current fracas grows out of a claim by the Independent Rockerbocker Ice Company.

"As soon as the Knickerbocker Ice Company ascertained that dealers from west of 32nd street were going away from John R. Murray & Sons and purchasing their ice from the Knickerbocker Ice Company, it immediately raised its price as to them to 55 cents per cake. It never:heless maintained its regular platform price to all others at 45 cents per cake."

John R. Murray, head of the John R. Murray and Son company of this place, was quite indignant when informed of the steps that were being taken.

"I have not been doing business with or buying ice from the Knickerbocker Ice Company for 10 years," he said. "The implication that there is price-fixing is ridicu-
