

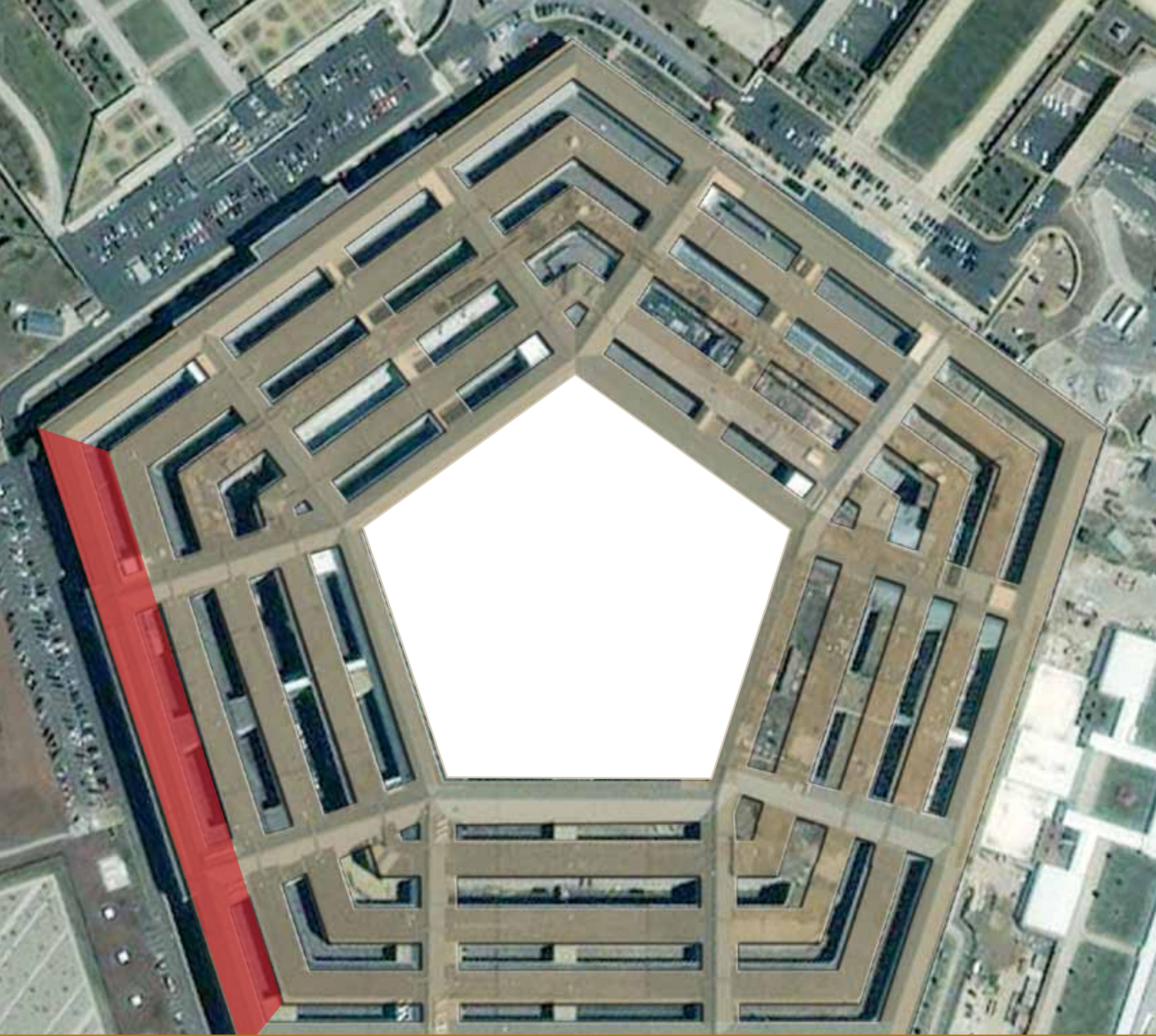

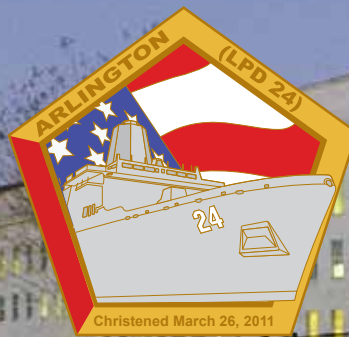

Pentagon Memorial, Arlington, Virginia

At 9:37 a.m. on Sept. 11, 2001, American Airlines Flight 77 crashed into the Pentagon, changing U.S. history forever. The Pentagon Memorial was dedicated on Sept. 11, 2008, to serve as an everlasting tribute to the 184 people who perished. Cantilevered benches, each over a pool of lighted water, are engraved with their names and arranged by age from 3-year-old Dana Falkenberg to 71-year-old John Yamnicky Sr. Benches representing those killed inside the Pentagon are arranged so one reading the names will face the Pentagon's southwest facade, where the plane hit. A person reading names of those aboard the plane will face skyward along the path traveled by the plane.





On behalf of 18,000 proud Gulf Coast shipbuilders, I'd like to welcome you to our Pascagoula shipyard for the christening of *Arlington* (LPD 24) – the eighth ship in the San Antonio amphibious transport dock class and the second of three ships to honor the heroes of 9/11.

Each ship we build represents two legacies. The first honors her past – her namesake – and the second anticipates the history she will create. *Arlington's* first legacy was born on a bright, clear Tuesday morning at 9:37 a.m. when the safety of our nation was threatened and hundreds of Americans, many in uniform, others not, redefined heroism.

Before you today is a testament to the service men and women, first responders and other citizen heroes, the protectors of our freedom, who on that tragic day became part of the fabric of our history and who shall forever be remembered. From the moment that we pierced the first piece of steel for *Arlington* (LPD 24), our shipbuilders have devoted themselves to keeping that history alive.

Today celebrates the start of the second legacy for the proud name of *Arlington*. There is history yet to be made by this ship, her officers and crews. "Strength, Honor, Fortitude:" These are the attributes of the brave men and women who made us so proud on that historic day. Attributes, too, of the officers and crews of *Arlington* who will make us proud in the years ahead.

Shipbuilding is a complex business. It is more than welding, electrical hookups and machining. It is at once art and science. But most of all, it is pride: pride in safely building complex warships that enable and protect the brave men and women who go into harm's way; pride in craftsmanship as our shipbuilders strive each day to do it right - and to do it right the first time; and pride in knowing they do an important job that serves our nation and helps defend our freedom.

So today we welcome you to our shipyard. We are honored to have Mrs. Joyce Rumsfeld here to christen this amazing warship. Her family knows firsthand the courage displayed on that fateful Tuesday morning. For it was her husband, the Honorable Donald H. Rumsfeld, former Secretary of Defense, in the Pentagon on 9/11, who was not only instrumental in our country's decisive response, but who also assisted first responders who came to the aid of the injured.

Today we also welcome Pentagon survivors, first responders, family members, and loved ones from that tragic day ten years ago in Arlington County, Virginia.

I am both humbled and proud to welcome members of my extraordinary team of shipbuilders. The men and women who built *Arlington* (LPD 24), a ship that both represents and defends our freedom.

Thank you for joining us as we honor our heroes, and celebrate the beginning of another shipbuilding legacy.

SHIP SPONSOR

Joyce Rumsfeld was born in Billings, Mont., and her family moved throughout the Midwest, settling near Chicago. She graduated from New Trier High School in Winnetka, Ill., also attended by her husband-to-be, Donald H. Rumsfeld. A hallmark year for Joyce was 1954, when she earned a Bachelor of Arts in art history from the University of Colorado and married Donald on Dec. 27.

In 1985, Joyce founded the Chicago Foundation for Education (CFE), to enhance education in Chicago public elementary schools, and served 13 years as chairperson. CFE has invested more than \$5.5 million into Chicago Public Schools, impacting nearly 30,000 teachers and more than one million students.

Joyce also served on the Big Shoulders Program at the Archdiocese of Chicago, the National Advisory Council of Character Education Partnership Inc. and the U.S. Department of Education's fund for Post-Secondary Education. She also served 12 years on the Board of Visitors and Governors at St. John's College, Annapolis, Md.

In 2006, The Department of Defense awarded Joyce the Distinguished Public Service Award in honor of her work with members of the U.S. military and their families.

Currently, Joyce co-chairs the non-profit Rumsfeld Foundation, supporting microfinance development projects, fellowships for graduate students interested in public service, exchange programs for young leaders from nations in Central Asia and the Caucasus, and charitable causes that benefit the men and women of the U.S. Armed Forces and their families.



ARLINGTON (LPD 24)

The amphibious transport dock ship *Arlington* (LPD 24) is the eighth ship in the LPD 17 class and the third ship named for Arlington County, Virginia, home to the Pentagon. *Arlington* is one of three ships being built by Northrop Grumman Shipbuilding in recognition of the heroes of September 11, 2001. The primary mission of the ship will be to embark, transport, and land U.S. Marine Corps landing forces in a variety of expeditionary and special operations missions, while providing ample command and control, communications connectivity, and medical and dental capability. The ship will support its embarked Marines and Sailors through expeditionary fighting vehicles (EFVs), landing craft air cushion (LCAC), MV-22 Osprey tilt-rotor aircraft, and CH-46 Sea Knight helicopters.

Crew: 28 officers, 332 enlisted Sailors, and 3 Marines

Embarked: Marine Expeditionary Force of 66 officers, 633 enlisted (surge to 800)

Armament: Two 30 mm Bushmaster II cannons, for surface threat defense; two Rolling Airframe Missile launchers for air defense

Propulsion: Four Colt-Pielstick diesel engines, two shafts, 40,000 hp (30 MW)

Length: 208.5 m (684 ft) overall *Beam:* 31.9 m (105 ft) extreme *Displacement:* 25,000 tons full *Speed:* 22 knots (41 km/h)

OTHER SHIPS NAMED FOR ARLINGTON



USS *Arlington* AGMR-2

Two previous ships have been named for Arlington, Va. The first was AP-174, a USS *Cape Johnson*-class transport. AP-174 was commissioned as USS *Arlington* on April 18, 1944, and served in the Asiatic-Pacific Theater during WWII.

The second USS *Arlington* was converted from USS *Saipan* (CVL-48) and served as a light aircraft carrier. She was converted to a communications relay ship and renamed USS *Arlington* (AGMR-2) in 1965. The ship and her crew earned seven campaign stars for service in Vietnam. AGMR-2 also assisted in recovering the manned space crews from two NASA missions, Apollo 8 and Apollo 10, as the primary landing area communications relay ship.

Commander Darren W. Nelson

UNITED STATES NAVY

PROSPECTIVE COMMANDING OFFICER, *ARLINGTON* (LPD 24)

U.S. Navy Cmdr. Darren W. Nelson will serve as the first Commanding Officer for *Arlington* (LPD 24) and will lead his crew of 28 Naval Officers, 332 enlisted Sailors, and 3 Marines, along with embarked Marines and Special Operations Forces, on missions supporting freedom and democracy around the world. Cmdr. Nelson is a native of Rushville, Neb. He received his commission and Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Nebraska in December 1993.

His initial sea tour was onboard USS *Bainbridge* (CGN 25), where he served as Communications Officer and Administrative Officer, followed by duty aboard USS *Barry* (DDG 52) in the Arabian Gulf as Damage Control Officer. He was next assigned to Regional Support Group Ingleside, Texas, as the Officer in Charge of the Integrated Support Group, sponsored by the Chief of Naval Operations to improve the reliability of mine hunting sonar.

Cmdr. Nelson then served onboard USS *Ingraham* (FFG 61) as the Combat Systems Officer and completed a deployment with the 5th fleet during Operation Enduring Freedom. Subsequently, he was assigned as the Deck Department Head (1st Lt.) of USS *Saipan* (LHA 2), helping Marines prepare for Operation Iraqi Freedom. Later, he was assigned as the Assistant Surface Operation Officer for Commander, Carrier Strike Group Eight. Cmdr. Nelson then served as Executive Officer (XO) of USS *Gunston Hall* (LSD 44), where he participated in another 5th Fleet deployment. Cmdr. Nelson holds a Master of Arts in National Security and Strategic Studies from the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, R.I.

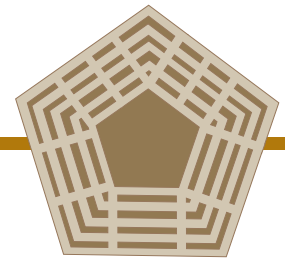

James Laychak, who lost his brother, David Laychak, in the attack on the Pentagon, is president of the Pentagon Memorial Fund and a member of Families of 9/11. When the Pentagon launched a design competition to create a memorial for those who died that day, Laychak was asked to serve on the committee that would select a design. The families wanted a memorial representing each lost life and creating a place for solace and healing. Before long, Laychak was president of the Pentagon Memorial Fund, leading the effort to raise the \$30 million needed for the memorial.



"When I see the reflected sunshine climb up the sides of the memorial units, I see the beauty of life. I hope the Pentagon Memorial will provide a sense of closure and comfort to all those who are still in pain. ... The memorial represents what great things can happen when we all work together to create something good."

Arlington, Virginia

In 1791, President George Washington commissioned architect Charles L'Enfant and geographer Andrew Ellicott to define the boundaries of Washington, D.C., assisted by Benjamin Banneker, a scientist and surveyor. At the time, federal construction on the Virginia side of the Potomac was prohibited. That area became Arlington, Va., the smallest self-governing county in the Continental United States. Its 26 square miles are dotted with memorials honoring our nation's heroes including the U.S. Air Force Memorial, U.S. Marine Corps Memorial, and the Women in the Military Memorial. More than 300,000 brave men and women from all of our nation's wars are also buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

THE PENTAGON

The Pentagon, headquarters for the U.S. Department of Defense, is the world's largest office building, containing 6.5 million square feet of office space. Each day, 23,000 military and civilian employees arrive at the Pentagon to defend the United States. In 1941, with much of Europe controlled by Nazi Germany, President Franklin D. Roosevelt rushed its construction. Ground was broken for the Pentagon on September 11, 1941, 60 years to the day prior to the 2001 attacks.

After the attacks, the damaged section of the Pentagon was reconstructed and occupied by Sept. 11, 2002, under the "Phoenix Project." Bearing the motto "Strength, Honor, Fortitude," the ship *Arlington* (LPD 24), like the occupants of the Pentagon, will serve to defend the United States and what our nation stands for around the world.

SYMBOLISM OF ARLINGTON'S CREST

SEAL: The coat of arms as blazoned in full color upon a white oval enclosed by a blue collar edged on the outside with a gold rope bearing the inscription "USS ARLINGTON" at top and in base "LPD 24" in gold letters. The rope has 184 twists, one for each of the lives lost at the Pentagon on September 11, 2001.

SHIELD: Dark blue and gold are the colors traditionally used by the Navy. The pentagon shaped shield, representing the Department of Defense, has a border the color of limestone buff except the red section of the Southwest wall, which symbolizes the area of the Pentagon where American Airlines Flight 77 crashed into the building on September 11, 2001. The laurel wreath is symbolic of honor and high achievement, and commemorates the heroism of the first responders to the Pentagon. The trident, representing sea prowess, underscores USS *Arlington's* mission to support the deployment of the

Marine Corps landing force to conduct amphibious warfare missions. The Pentagon's location in Arlington County is highlighted by the Arlington House adapted from the Arlington County seal.

CREST: The thirteen stars between the rays are from the Department of Defense seal. The two benches with the trees represent two of the 184 illuminated benches of the Pentagon

Memorial, a permanent outdoor memorial to the lives lost at the Pentagon site. The bald eagle, embodiment of strength, vigilance and resolve, is long associated with the United States of America and our Armed Forces. It is soaring above, bowing its head in respect for the fallen.

The eagle's wings echo the shape of the Memorial Benches.

SUPPORTERS: The crossed Navy Officer sword and Chief Petty Officer cutlass, and Marine Corps Officer and Non-Commissioned Officer swords symbolize the teamwork of the Navy-Marine Corps team of the amphibious transport dock ship, USS *Arlington*.

Joyce Rumsfeld was born in Billings, Montana and after moves to Fargo, N.D., Minneapolis, and Milwaukee she ended up in the Chicago area while in grammar school. She graduated from New Trier High School where she and her husband, Don Rumsfeld, were classmates. She received a B.A. in Art History from the University of Colorado in 1954.

Mrs. Rumsfeld was the founder of the Chicago Foundation for Education (CFE) in 1985 and served as chairman of its board of directors for thirteen years. The foundation is dedicated to enhancing the education of children in the Chicago public elementary schools. In the last 25 years, CFE has invested more than 5.5 million dollars in the Chicago Public Schools, impacting nearly 30,000 teachers and more than 1 million students. From the beginning, the foundation has emphasized support for character education curriculum, which seeks to integrate teaching practices that encourage responsible decision-making and the need for teamwork, respect and tolerance in the classroom. This year the Chicago Foundation for Education will be hosting the 22nd Annual Teachers as Leaders and Learners Workshop, bringing together hundreds of teachers for a day of inspiration, collegiality, networking and sharing of effective teaching practices.

Mrs. Rumsfeld has served on the Big Shoulders Program at the Archdiocese of Chicago, the National Advisory Council of Character Education Partnership, Inc, and the U.S. Department of Education's Fund for Improvement of Post-Secondary Education. She also served on the Board of Visitors and Governors at St. John's College for 12 years.

In honor of her work with members of the U.S. military and their families, on December 15, 2006, Mrs. Rumsfeld was awarded the Department of Defense's Distinguished Public Service Award.

Currently, Mrs. Rumsfeld chairs a non-profit foundation with her husband. The Rumsfeld Foundation supports microfinance development projects, fellowships for graduate students interested in public service, exchange programs for young leaders from nations in Central Asia and the Caucasus, and funds charitable causes that benefit the men and women of the U.S. Armed Forces and their families.

James Schwartz

Fire Chief

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James Schwartz was named Fire Chief for Arlington County Fire Department in June 2004. Chief Schwartz has been with Arlington Fire for 24 years and has served a variety of fire department positions before becoming Fire Chief.

Among those assignments, he served as Assistant Chief of Operations, overseeing all response-related activities, including fire, EMS, hazardous materials and technical rescue response, incident management and operational training. His service also included an assignment to the Office of the County Manager where he served as Director of Emergency Management until his appointment to Fire Chief.

Chief Schwartz chairs the Sustainment Committee for Arlington County's Metropolitan Medical Response System, a federally funded program that focuses on the integration of a community's response capabilities for mass casualty incidents. He is also a member of the Interagency Board on Equipment Standardization, and the International Association of Fire Chiefs' Committee on Terrorism and Homeland Security.

Chief Schwartz serves on the Board of Regents for Leadership Arlington, an organization that develops and connects leaders in the public, private and non-profit sectors of Arlington.

Chief Schwartz graduated from the University of Maryland with a Bachelor's degree in Fire Administration.

Commander Nelson is a native of Rushville, Nebraska. He received his commission and Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Nebraska December 1993. His initial sea tour was onboard USS BAINBRIDGE (CGN 25), where he served as Communications Officer and Administrative Officer.

His second sea assignment was as Damage Control Officer in USS BARRY (DDG 52), where he deployed to the Arabian Gulf conducting visit board search and seizure operations. Following BARRY, he was assigned to Regional Support Group Ingleside Texas and served as the OIC of the Integrated Support Group. ISG was a CNO sponsored group to improve the reliability of the Mine Hunting sonar. Upon completion of Department Head School, he served onboard USS INGRAHAM (FFG 61) as the Combat Systems Officer and completed a deployment to the 5th fleet AOR during the initial operations of Enduring Freedom.
