USE WIRE TO TIE VICTIM

Crime Undiscovered for Four Hours-Police Believe Criminals "Professionals."

Three robbers entered the Hudson Thes. tre in Forty-fourth street, between Sixth avenue and Broadway, last night, held up. bound and gagged a watchman and then blew open the safe in the box office, from which they stole about \$2,500, representing the receipts for Saturday's matinee and evening performances. They made good their escape and their daring deed did not come to light until nearly four hours later, when the plight of the watchman was discovered by his relief.

Patrick Downis of 669 Ninth avenue, the day watchman, started to walk down the east aisle of the theatre from the stage at 8:30 o'clock, when three forms lifted themselves from seats and ordered him to throw up his hands.

One man pointed a gun ut Downis's head and he surrendered. The others tied a handkerchief over his mouth and secured his arms and legs with wire. They drew fong loops of wire around his body and said him in the middle of the aisle.

Stands Guard With Gun. One man stood guard over Downis with

a gun and the others made their way to the box office, the door of which faces the street. They drew a cloth over a window looking out on the street and proceeded to drill holes in the safe. It is believed the work took at least an hour and a half. The police admitted that the job showed skilled workmanship. Then they stole all the money out of the safe, scattered papers and documents over the floor and passed out of the theatre through the rear. The police are satisfled that they entered by the stage en-

Charles O'Donnell, the night watchman, who lives at 444 West Fifty-eighth street, got to the theatre at midnight. He saw what had happened the moment he poked his nose into the box office and called in Bergt. Dynan of the West Forty-seventh street station. VILLA OBEYS CARRANZA ORDER

Will Join in Occupation of Mexico City, Say Revolutionists,

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 .- President Carbajal will not make any determined effort to resist the occupation of Mexico City by the Constitutionalists, it was said by members of the revolutionary agency here to-night. It was asserted at the junts that advices have been received showing conclusively that Carbajal has no intention of resorting to arms to keep out the Constitutionalists.

According to the agency's calculations Carranza will have 50,000 men approach-ing close to Maxico City this week, which is superior to the total strength of the remaining Federal forces. A despatch was received at the agency to-night saying that Villa had started south with his division to participate in the occupation of the capital.

Tals the Constitutionalists assert is in accordance with orders sent to Villa by Carranza, and they point to Villa's obe-dience of them as conclusive proof of the faisity of reports that he is plotting to break with Carranza and set up an independent government in the north.

Ansco Company Heads Accused in Suit Over Pastor Goodwin's Rights.

A fight for the share of the money paid by the Eastman Company in settlement of the suit brought by the Ansco Company for infringement on the film invented by the late Rev. Hannibal Goodwin has been started in the Supreme Court with a suit in which, charges are made against Ruel W. Poor, president of the Garfield National Bank; Walter H. Bennett, vice-president and director of the American Exchange Bank, and Thomas W. Stephens, president of the Ansco Company. The suit is brought by Charles Brock in

behalf of himself and other stockholders of the Anthony & Scoville Company and an accounting of nearly \$1,000,000 is sought. The complaint states that in 1903 the Anthony & Scoville Company was in financial difficulties with pressing representing their banks, which had the largest claims. They demanded a to enable them to protect their claims The complaint says that the Anthony

Scoville Company had an agreement with Mrs. Rebecca Goodwin, widow of the incompany held 5,100 of the 9,980 shares of the Goodwin Film and Camera Company, formed to manufacture the Goodwin film, and they also had the right to buy the remaining Goodwin stock for \$490.000. The complaint alleges that the Anthony & Scoville Company brought the infringement suit against the Eastman Company in 1902 and had reasonable hope

Poor and Bennett, the complaint says, demanded that the Anthony & Scoville Company assign the Goodwin rights to the banks and to Stephens as creditors. This was done, and the Goodwin agreement was then cancelled and the agreement returned to the Goodwin company. It is aleged that this procedure was part of a conspiracy by Poor, Bennett and Stephens to defraud the Anthony & Scoville Company out of the Goodwin stock. The amount paid by the Eastman Company to the Ansco Company, the complaint says, was sufficient to discharge all on stocks and bonds, and to pay a 100


