Nepean Show
DATES ALTERED.
TO BE HELD A MONTH LATER
RURAL BANK TAKES OVER MORTGAGE.

The Committee of the Nepean District A.H. and L. Society had their final meeting for 1923 at The Exchange on Friday night last. Owing to severe storm which occurred just at sundown the attendance was not as large as usual. The President, Mr. M. C. D. Lowe, presided.

Rural Bank Takes Over Mortgage.
 A letter from the Manager of the Rural Bank was read by the Secretary, in which it stated that the bank had agreed to take over the existing mortgage and advance to Society sufficient to pay all its liabilities, provided that everything in connection with same was in order.

The information was received with satisfaction by the Committee and they will not be able to go ahead with the preparation for the holding of the annual show.

Show Dates Altered
 Considerable discussion took place over a motion by the President to alter the dates of the show. However, after the President explained the position fully to the meeting it was decided to hold the show on 20th, 21st, and 22nd March, 1924, instead of 21st, 22nd, and 23rd February, as previously arranged. This alteration is mainly due to the continued dry weather conditions, but it is hoped now that another month is given that the farmers etc., will rise to the occasion and send along their exhibits early.

It was decided that the Ground Committee meet on the ground on Saturday, 5th January, and report to next committee meeting, which will be held on Thursday, 10th January.

It was decided to write to the printer and ascertain if it would be possible for him to have the schedules ready by the 15th, January or thereabouts, as the Committee is anxious that these should be distributed as early as possible in the new year.

The secretary reported having interviewed Messrs A. Judges, W. B. Walker, and W. Gillen as acting trustees for the society, and each had consented to act in the capacity.

Mr. Dick Colless was welcomed to the committee and Mr. H. Hosman was appointed in lieu of Mr. H. Davy resigned.

The meeting concluded by the president wishing the members of the committee a happy and prosperous New Year.

A POPULAR RESORT.

On Sunday last the crowd that attended this splendid bathing resort amounted to about 300, on Monday 31st ult., the number was easily increased to 400 or more, while on New Year's Day something like 1,400 or 1,500 would be nearer the mark. Visitors from all parts of the district were noticed, and from almost all towns between here and Sydney. Motor cars, motor Lorries, sulkeys, and carts they came in and from early morning till late in the evening they were coming and going. From the tiny toddlers above two years of age up to granddads and grandmothers they were all there sporting themselves in the placid waters of the Nepean.

It is rumored that some of our "Surf" girls are entering for the "Daily Guardian" championship. Our representative saw the photographer snapping some of the district "Beauties" on New Year's Day. It is understood that a move is to be made shortly to get the Blue Mountains Shire Council and Penrith Council to co-operate in an endeavour to get the Government to resume a portion of the land above the beach on Emu side of the river for a reserve. If this is successful, perhaps bathing facilities could then be arranged, and a drive made for cars, etc., right down to the beach. Another move in the right direction would be to appoint a ranger for Sundays and holidays to prevent any vandalism. MADE IN AUSTRALIA.

Miss Stella Franklin
 An ex-Penrithite, in the person of Miss Stella Miles Franklin, arrived from America by the Tahiti recently. Miss Franklin is well known to Australians as the author of "My Brilliant Career," which several years ago was hailed as the first real Australian novel. Since those days Miss Franklin has thrown her energy into most of the big problems that have confronted women. For several years she was the guiding force behind the women's settlement work in Chicago, and, with Miss Alice Henry, edited "Life and Labor," the first magazine in America owned and edited by women. Woman suffrage and trade union matters also claimed her attention. Miss Franklin served during the war with the Scottish Women's Hospital in Serbia, and contracted malaria there, which resulted in her being invalided back to England. From this experience Miss Franklin has not recovered, and it is her conviction that back again in the Australian bush she will regain that strength necessary for her to carry on her work as literature secretary of the National Housing and Town Planning Council of London.
