

Heffernan Host to Party Workers at Victory Dinner

Democratic Leader of Twelfth A. D. Entertains Park Slope Supporters at Prospect Hall.

Highways Superintendent James J. Heffernan, who between official duties is Democratic leader of the Twelfth Assembly District, last night had the honor of being the first district chief to play the role of Santa Claus.

The popular Park Slope-Windsor Terrace leader was host to two hundred and fifty workers of the Twelfth Assembly District at Prospect Hall, and the affair is now down in political history as one of "Heffernan's big nights."

Only "honor workers," those actively identified with the task of electing the Democratic ticket in the Twelfth Assembly District were present. Tickets were not for sale because it is the one night in the year that Supt. Heffernan reserves for his workers to be rewarded.

An elaborate dinner was served and during the entire night a cabaret revue entertained the guests. There was not a dull moment from the time the affair started until the tired but happy guests departed from Prospect Hall at an early hour this morning.

When not eating or partaking of refreshments they danced to the music of a ten-piece orchestra.

Host Never Rested. Supt. Heffernan was busy every minute. He was chairman of the arrangement, music, dinner and reception committees. He was master of ceremonies, toastmaster, though one was not necessary, floor manager and cheer leader.

The Park Slope chief attended to everything himself, though now and then he gave Deputy Sheriff Joseph G. Saunders an opportunity to do a little. The deputy sheriff's main duties were in seeing that the law was not violated and he made a success of the job.

Everyone voted "Jim" a "jolly good fellow" and it was generally declared he was the prince of district leaders in Brooklyn.

Accused of being disobedient, Guido Bruno, 19, of 82E Fourteenth avenue, appeared in Coney Island court yesterday on complaint of his mother, Mrs. Julia Bruno, of the same address. The woman told Magistrate Reynolds the youth loitered in pool parlors and remained away from home at night.

Bruno pleaded guilty and promised to do better in the future. After a reprimand by the magistrate sentence was suspended upon him.

Street Obstructor Fined. Following numerous complaints received at the Bath Beach police station about the condition of Bay Parkway, between Bath and Benson avenues, Patrolman James P. Collins last Wednesday served a summons upon a man described as Harry Epstein, 53, of 129 Bay Twenty-third street, charged with violation of the city ordinance in using more than a half of the thoroughfare for storing building material.

In fining the man \$10, Magistrate Reynolds remarked that too much liberty is taken by contractors in blocking the public streets while they are constructing houses.
