"It will no doubt prove to be time well and profitably spent for the Broadway Board of Trade and other civic bodies in Brooklyn to give close attention to the provisions of the contract which it is believed will soon be drawn up for the running of elevated roads over the Williamsburg Bridge. This contract should provide for the continuation of the elevated structure on Delancey street as far as the Bowery, and nothing short of this plan should be accepted by the people of Brooklyn. If this project were carried into execution it would be possible for the Brooklyn surface cars to run to the Bowery also, for by carrying the overhead wires under the elevated roads, the great objection raised by the people of Manhaitan against the installation of overhead trolley wires would undoubtedly be overcome.
