

With the success of the Lionesses having changed the map for women's football forever, come and hear the legendary Ayrshire footballer Rose Reilly MBE, the only Scottish person to have won a football World Cup.

Despite her early and obvious skills on the park she was barred from playing football with the boys at school, and so took to disguising herself as a boy called 'Ross'.

During the 1960s and 1970s it was unheard of for a woman to be a successful football player in Scotland, so at just 17, Rose moved abroad to become a professional footballer with Reims in France before moving to AC Milan where, in 1983 she scored the winning goal in the Women's World Cup final which gave Italy the title over the United States of America, and was voted the world's best female footballer. Rose also represented Scotland at international level.

Louise Baillie's new book *Spectacular Scottish Women* tells the story of 30 inspirational women including poet Jackie Kay, percussionist Evelyn Glennie and Rose Reilly herself.

JACKIE KAY 18:00 / £10, £8c

May Day is the long-awaited new collection from one of our best-loved poets and former Makar of Scotland, Jackie Kay. As the title suggests, these poems cast an eye over several decades of political activism, from the international solidarity of the Glasgow of Kay's childhood, accompanying her parents' Socialist campaigns, through the feminist, LGBT+ and antiracist movements of the 80s and 90s, up to the present day when a global pandemic intersects with the urgency of Black Lives Matter.

Kay brings to life a cast of influential figures, delving beneath the surfaces of received narratives: the Jamaican model Fanny Eaton, for example, muse of the Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood in England; Paul Robeson, Angela Davis and the poet Audre Lorde; and a 'what-if' poem concerning Rabbie Burns and a road-nottaken towards the West Indian slave trade. Woven through the collection is a suite of lyric poems concerning the recent losses of Kay's parents: poems of grief and profound change that are infused with the light of love and celebration.




William and Dorothy Wordsworth are an essential element in this powerful memoir of recovery from mental illness.

In her early twenties, Esther Rutter suffered a breakdown while teaching English in Japan. Sectioned and held in a Japanese psychiatric institution until she could be flown home her recovery only began when she went to live and work in the Lake District becoming immersed in the realm of the great poet William Wordsworth.

As an intern at Dove Cottage, Wordsworth's home, at first Rutter finds the landscape itself is alien and intimidating and lurking among those hills is the fear of a regression into her mental illness.

Slowly she sets about drawing together from her surroundings the threads of her personal story, recovery and the legacy of the Wordsworth siblings who brought her there.

Her search for a sense of belonging intertwined with the stories of the Wordsworths and the Dove Cottage community culminated in lifelong bonds of friendship, and – finally – love.




John le Carré's biographer reveals the secret life of the man that he was not able to include in his 'supposed' definitive 2015 portrait of the writer. Along the way he explores the complex relationship that a biographer faces when writing about a subject who is still alive.


Secrecy came naturally to le Carré, and there were some secrets that he fought fiercely to keep – even from his chosen biographer. Nowhere more so than in his private life.

Apparently content in his marriage, the novelist conducted a string of love affairs over four decades, which introduced both jeopardy and excitement into what was otherwise a quiet, ordered life. Le Carré seemed to require the stimulus they provided in order to write. To keep these relationships secret, he made use of tradecraft that he had learned as a spy.

The Secret Life of John le Carré allows Sisman to at last paint the full portrait. As he says: 'Now that he is dead, we can know him better.'

BEN MARTYNOGA 10:45 / £10, £8c

Rewilding is a powerful concept. While some see it as a miracle cure, others see it as a menace. Biologist and writer Ben Martynoga argues that - though not always easy rewilding must be an essential part of our future. As climate change and biodiversity loss accelerate, he reminds us that all humans rely on thriving nature. Martynoga will highlight inspiring rewilding projects already underway globally. He will also introduce species with the power to revive ecosystems – from otters nurturing kelp forests to lynx helping trees grow and resurrected woolly mammoths that could keep the Arctic frozen.

Author of the award-winning *Explodapedia*, a pioneering nonfiction series introducing biology's biggest ideas to readers 12y and up, Martynoga's writing about science and the environment also appears in *The Guardian*, *New Statesman* and the *Financial Times*.

Anyone who has stood beneath the soaring canopy of London's King's Cross station or crossed the elegant threshold of the revitalised Burrell Collection will have experienced the particular genius of super-star Scottish architect John McAslan. Born and educated in Dunoon, trained at Edinburgh University, McAslan enjoys an international reputation as one of the most innovative, humane and socially aware architects of the age. His landmark projects range

from New York's Penn Station to Doha's Cultural Quarter in Qatar. At the same time, McAslan has never neglected his Scottish roots nor his sense of social responsibility. He has transformed Dunoon's derelict Burgh Hall into a vibrant arts centre run as a charity; and has launched the Hidden Homelessness initiative to find architectural solutions to one of society's greatest blights. For a blast of positivity in these ugly times, discover John McAslan's rare ability to create beautiful and utile buildings to improve all our lives.



This is the true story of the assassination of an undercover British agent, at the centre of a web of secrets, lies and betrayals, and how it led to the largest murder investigation in British history.


In a double twist, best-selling author,


RICHARD WHATMORE

The Enlightenment is popularly seen as the Age of Reason, a key moment in human history when ideals such as freedom, progress, natural rights and constitutional government prevailed. In this radical re-evaluation, historian Richard Whatmore shows why, for many at its centre, the Enlightenment was a profound failure.

The End of Enlightenment traces the changing perspectives of economists, philosophers, politicians and polemicists around the world, including figures as diverse as David Hume, Adam Smith, Edmund Burke and Mary Wollstonecraft. They had strived to replace superstition with reason, but witnessed instead terror and revolution, corruption, gross commercial excess and the continued growth of violent colonialism.

Returning us to the tumultuous events and ideas of the eighteenth century and digging deep into the thought of the men and women who defined their age, Whatmore asks "Do we once again live in a world that has suffered an end of enlightenment as strategies formulated after 1945 have gradually failed or been abandoned?"

King James VI and I has long suffered from being damned with faint praise as the 'wisest fool in Christendom'. Two new biographies tell a different story.

Historian Steven Reid's is the first detailed narrative of the king's childhood, education and shrewdly planned rise to power at the age of 19 after a lifetime controlled by Regents. He also throws fresh light on James's relationship with his mother, imprisoned in England; and sets his reign and culture in Scotland within the wider context of other Protestant courts in Europe.

Novelist and historian Steven Veerapen's portrait of the king and his English court debunks the caricature of history to reveal the sovereign as his contemporaries knew him: a gregarious idealist obsessed with the idea of family, whose personal and political goals could never match up to reality. With reference to letters, libels and state papers, this portrait illuminates the personal, domestic, international and sexual politics of this misunderstood and much under-estimated sovereign.


82 years after the unexpected fall of Singapore she has shared the poignant story of her childhood in *In the Shadow of the Rising Sun*.


In February 1942, the tranquil life of nine-year-old Olga Morris in Johor Buru was abruptly shattered. With 20 minutes to gather essentials before being loaded into a truck and driven across the causeway before it was blown up, the moment of leaving

remains etched in Olga's memory. As bombs rained down on Singapore, the family rushed to the Harbour but, denied passage, they endured the relentless bombardment of the city before eventually being captured by the Japanese army. Nearly three years of captivity at the notorious Changi Jail and Sime Road camp followed.

Join Olga as she unveils a compelling story of a childhood lost in the shadows of war and a testament to the enduring human spirit in the face of adversity.

Pat reflects on the secrecy of the 'Y' Service (wireless interception) and the impact of the war on her family including not knowing that her sister Jean was serving with the Special Operations executive (S.O.E). At the same time their father was a prisoner of war on the river Kwai. Pat's vital work in the lead-up to D-Day led to her being awarded the Legion of Honour by the French government.

From a fairytale childhood to playing a crucial role in turning the tide of war Pat went on to become a journalist and a pioneering woman TV producer.

Codebreaking Sisters and Century Sisters were both co-written with her late sister Jean.




The Pax Romana has long been revered as a golden age. At its peak, the Roman Empire stretched from Scotland to Arabia, and contained perhaps a quarter of humanity. It was the wealthiest and most formidable state the world had yet seen.

Vividly sketching the lives of Romans both ordinary and spectacular, from slaves to emperors, and beginning in 69AD, a year that saw four Caesars in succession rule the empire - and ending some seven decades later with the death of Hadrian, Pax presents a dazzling history of Rome at the height of its power.

From the gilded capital to realms beyond the frontier, historian Tom Holland portrays the Roman Empire in all its predatory glory: from the destruction of Jerusalem and Pompeii to the building of the Colosseum and Hadrian's Wall and the conquests of Trajan.

No one has done more than Xinran, the British-Chinese author, journalist and activist, to tell the truth about the lives of ordinary people in twentieth-century China. Her first books, The Good Women of China and Sky Burial, recounted some of these stories.

In her latest book, *The Book of Secrets*, the lives of military intelligence officer Jie and his wife Moon, a family torn apart by the Tiananmen Square massacre, are woven into a narrative using a recently found archive of personal diaries and letters that not only illuminates the shadowy world of intelligence in China, but also the emotional tragedies that political extremism inflicts on those working within.

Drawing on Jie's own vivid biography of his youth, Xinran pieces together his trajectory as he joins the great hope of the Chinese young – the Communist Party – and becomes a loyal cadre until the late 1970s when, as a chief in the security forces, he makes a decision that will poison his family against him.







In a political landscape of partisan squabbles and mudslinging, Curtice's 'just the facts' analysis brings a refreshing objectivity to the conversation.



Which writers changed your life? For GP Gavin Francis, the bestselling author of *Recovery*, it's the seventeenth century physician Sir Thomas Browne.

BECOMING A COMPOSER



ERROLLYN WALLEN WITH JAMES MACMILLAN 15:15 / £10, £8c

When Errollyn Wallen, aged nine, told her uncle that she could hear 'all these sounds in my head' and didn't know what to do with them, he suggested that perhaps she was a composer. Today Wallen is an international composer and singersongwriter, as much at home with pop and jazz than with classical music. But it was a tortuous journey for the girl born in Belize, brought up in Tottenham, to fulfil her calling, surviving childhood abuse, a suicide attempt and racial prejudice.

This is a memoir, brilliantly told through diary entries, poetry and vivid prose, of the triumph of creativity and musicianship, which has seen Wallen conduct her operas and orchestral works in the world's greatest theatres and concert halls. One of her recent operas, Dido's Ghost, was composed in Strathy Point lighthouse in the Highlands, where she frequently returns as it 'has opened a new door to creativity.'


Niven, author and screenwriter, himself no stranger to some of the self-destructive urges that bedevilled his brother, is wellknown for his fiction, but his award-winning memoir, by turns heart-breaking and uproariously funny, evokes a working-class childhood of the 1970s and 80s in Irvine, a time when his little brother Gary was fearless, popular, stubborn, handsome, funny and sometimes terrifying, as it tries to answer the questions of quilt, culpability and regret that often haunt the survivors of suicide.

Niven's other best-selling books include Kill your Friends, The Second Coming and Straight White Male.





When Russian tanks rolled into Ukraine, millions of lives changed in an instant: people were suddenly on the move and in this great flow of people was a journalist from Shetland.

Jen Stout left Moscow abruptly, ending up on a border post in southeast Romania, from where she began to cover the human cost of Russian aggression.

Working alone, her first-hand, vivid reporting brought the war in cities across Ukraine, first Odesa, then Kharkiv, Mykolaiv, Kyiv and Donbas home to readers in Scotland.

A writer always seeking to understand the bigger picture of the history, hopes and fears in this war in Europe, in her first book *Night Train to Odesa* she brings to life stories from those on the ground, from those enduring and surviving the daily catastrophe of the conflict, from the night trains, birthday parties, military hospitals and bunkers.

Walking the entire 19,000-mile coastline of the UK saved his life but the real journey here is one of self-discovery.

Only with the home stretch to Wales in sight did Chris slowly come back into himself and the adventurous family of four completed their epic challenge in July 2023.

JAMES NAUGHTIE

Round off the festival in the company of veteran BBC broadcaster, James Naughtie, whose mellifluous tones and calm analysis have brought enlightenment and joy to generations of listeners to Radios 3 and 4.

With his unrivalled knowledge of US politics going back over forty years, Naughtie's *On The Road: American Adventures from Nixon to Trump* was acclaimed 'as a spell-binding tapestry of a nation'. Following his recent return to the States, he will share his frontline observations in this presidential year. On the home front, he will bring with his trademark fluency, laced with wit and wisdom, his unique take on the political rows, scandals and electioneering both north and south of the Border.

Woven into his commentary on actual events, Naughtie, a host of Radio 4's Book Club, will also discuss his latest thriller, *The Spy Across the Water* hailed by Lee Child as 'the best kind - intelligent, resonant, suspenseful... and plausible'. Set at a political turning point in the 1980s, with his protagonist, an ex-spook, now Ambassador in Washington, caught up in the Cold War and the Northern Ireland Troubles, Naughtie's fiction proves just as enthralling as his masterly grasp of Realpolitik.



James Boswell sprang from an ancient Ayrshire family, which had been settled at Auchinleck since the sixteenth century. He was born in Edinburgh in 1740 where his father, who became Lord Auchinleck, was a Judge in the Supreme Court of Scotland. His mother was descended from a minor branch of Scottish royalty.

He was educated at Edinburgh University followed by Glasgow University, where he attended the lectures of the great Enlightenment philosopher, Adam Smith. From the start, Bozzy as he was affectionately known, was drawn to the pleasureloving side of life. His first visit to London at the age of 19 began a love affair with the city which never wavered. His charm, sensitivity and intelligence opened doors to the most brilliant men of the day, but the ultimate prize for Boswell was his friendship with the towering figure of Dr Samuel Johnson – compiler of the definitive dictionary of the English language and celebrated man of letters. Boswell's friendship led him to become Johnson's biographer and the account of his life, published 220 years ago this May, has never been out of print. His Life of Johnson established him as the inventor of modern biography and has upheld his reputation as one of the most innovative writers of the Enlightenment.

Boswell was also author of a pioneering travel book *An Account of Corsica* and his famous *Journal of a Tour to the Hebrides*, which described an expedition made to the Western Isles with Dr Johnson. At the end of their journey, they stayed at Auchinleck where Johnson famously crossed swords with Boswell's father.

Boswell's fame redoubled in the twentieth century with the discovery and publication of his diaries, setting him alongside Pepys as one of the greatest diarists in the English language. Boswell ushered in the confessional memoir, which is so popular today. Nothing was omitted - including his innumerable sexual encounters, his battle with depression, his difficult relationship with his father, his frustrated political ambition and his life as a lawyer in the Scottish courts.

Boswell was an Ayrshireman through and through. He married his cousin, Margaret Montgomerie, with whom he had five children, and became Laird of Auchinleck on the death of his father in 1782 and devoted much time and money to the care of the Estate. He died in 1795 and was interred in the Boswell Mausoleum in Auchinleck churchyard.

PAY A VISIT TO THE BOSWELL QUILL

Installed in historic Auchinleck churchyard in November 2020 in the midst of lockdown, this giant bronze feather writing quill celebrates both the inventor of modern biography, James Boswell, and the universal power of the written word. The sculpture lies at the heart of a new visitor experience at Auchinleck churchyard where the famous biographer is interred. Four years in the making, the ambitious project, which is an all-round visitor destination, has involved re-landscaping around the existing war memorial, planting borders of shrubs as well as hedges and trees, including twelve yews named the Twelve Apostles.

A network of paths has been restored for visitors to explore the graveyard on a series of trails including one for children. A new sign at the entrance explains all, including the history of the site, along with leaflet holders of printed maps.

James Knox, chairman of the Boswell Trust, said: 'The Quill is destined to become a unique landmark as there is nothing like it in Scotland or the rest of the UK.

The Trust is enormously grateful to LEADER, who provided the bulk of the funding, as well as to other private trusts for enabling us to commission the sculpture and to enhance its beautiful setting.'


