ST. PETERSBURG COLLEGE

Overview

Access and excellence are the hallmarks of St. Petersburg College, founded in 1927 as St. Petersburg Junior College, Florida's first two-year institution of higher education.

Today the college stands as a multi-campus, two-year and four-year public institution with learning sites countywide in St. Petersburg, Clearwater, Tarpon Springs, Pinellas Park, Largo and Seminole. More than 63,000 students a year are served by SPC, including students in residence from many countries.

In July, 2009, after more than 43 years of dedicated service to St. Petersburg College – 31 as president – President Carl M. Kuttler Jr. announced his retirement. He is one of the longest-serving college or university presidents in Florida.

During his tenure, the college expanded from two campuses to 10 learning sites, and now has one of the most highly acclaimed distance learning programs in the nation. Under Kuttler's leadership, the college added baccalaureate degrees to its educational offerings in 2002, becoming the first among Florida's 28 public community colleges to transition to a four-year institution. SPC now offers 23 bachelor's degrees, most in areas that have traditionally been underserved by the State University System.

The Seminole Campus, which opened in August 1998, includes the C.W. Bill Young University Partnership Center (UPC) and the Dennis L. Jones Seminole Community Library. Since 1999, the UPC has enabled students to earn baccalaureate and graduate degrees from partner institutions without leaving Pinellas County. There are now 17 partners offering more than 100 degrees.

Following the June 2001 legislation signed by Gov. Jeb Bush that enabled SPJC to offer bachelor's degrees, the college dropped the "Junior" from its name, but not its commitment to its two-year mission, which remains as strong as ever.

In May, 2009, The American Stage Theatre joined The Florida International Museum, The Florida Orchestra, and the box office for The Palladium Theater at the college's Downtown Center, solidifying the location as SPC's Downtown Arts Cultural Center. The college also owns the Leepa-Rattner Museum on the Tarpon Springs Campus.

St. Petersburg College seeks to be a creative leader and partner with students, communities, service agencies, businesses and other educational institutions to deliver enriched learning experiences and to promote economic and workforce development.

The work of its outstanding, diverse faculty and staff is enhanced by advanced technologies, online learning, international education opportunities, innovative teaching techniques, comprehensive library and other information resources, continuous institutional self-evaluation, a climate for student success and an enduring commitment to excellence.

St. Petersburg College is dedicated to the concept of equal opportunity. The college will not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin or marital status, or against any qualified individual with disabilities, in its employment practices or in the admission and treatment of students. Recognizing that sexual harassment constitutes discrimination on the basis of sex and violates this rule, the college will not tolerate such conduct.

Degrees offered

<u>Bachelor of Applied Science (B.A.S.) degrees</u> — St. Petersburg College offers B.A.S. degrees in Banking, Dental Hygiene, Health Services Administration, International Business, Management and Organizational Leadership, Orthotics and Prosthetics, Paralegal Studies, Public Safety Administration, Sustainability Management, Technology Management, and Veterinary Technology.

<u>Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degrees</u> — St. Petersburg College offers a B.S. in Education with nine different areas of concentration and a B.S. in Nursing, Biology, and Business Administration.

<u>Associate in Arts (A.A.) degrees</u> — Students can choose from more than 200 majors that transfer to virtually any accredited university worldwide. An A.A. degree from SPC, by law, grants admission as a junior to one of the state's 10 public universities.

<u>Associate in Science (A.S.) degrees</u> — Students gain skills for careers in as little as two years. A.S. degrees enable students to enter the workforce immediately after graduation and allow those already in fields to upgrade their job skills. A.S. degrees in some fields grant students admission to other private and public universities.

<u>Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.) degrees</u> — Students gain skills for careers in as little as two years. A.A.S. degrees enable students to enter the workforce immediately after graduation and allow those already in fields to upgrade their job skills.

<u>Technical Certificates (C.T.)</u> - Students can prepare for new professions or enhance existing job skills, in less time than an Associate in Science degree. In some cases, students can complete a C.T. within a year.

<u>Advanced Technical Certificates (A.T.C.)</u> —Advanced Technical Certificates are currently offered in different areas of Health Science, and can be awarded to students who already have an associate degree and are seeking advanced training.

<u>Applied Technology Diploma (A.T.D.)</u> — An Applied Technology Diploma is part of an Associate in Science degree (A.S.) or an Associate in Applied Science degree (A.A.S.), but is less than 60 credit hours. An Applied Technology Diploma program may consist of either vocational or college credit and can lead to employment in specific occupations.

Some of the college's honors in 2008-09:

- Ranked No. 8 in the U.S. for the number of associate degrees awarded annually in nursing
- Ranked No. 12 in the U.S. for the number of associate degrees awarded annually in health professions
- Ranked No. 10 in the U.S. in associate degrees awarded

Highlights for 2008-09

- The CBS Evening News featured the college's Veterinary Technology program and some students in a segment that aired in February on the top recession-proof jobs in the country. The story was picked up nationally by several media outlets. As a follow-up, the local NBC affiliate, News Channel 8, also aired a segment that included Dean Richard Flora.
- The St. Petersburg Collegiate High School continues to excel. SPCHS was the only Pinellas County high school ranked an "A" school by the Florida Department of Education for 2008-09 and received an "A+" designation by the City of St. Petersburg. Ninety-seven percent of the SPCHS grads received both high school and Associate in Arts diplomas. The total dollar value of scholarships awarded to SPCHS students was more than \$1.5 million. The high school also had one National Merit scholarship finalist and one National Achievement scholarship finalist. SPCHS also had five students who were commended National Merit scholars.
- The college acquired the Gulf Coast Museum of Art permanent collection in February. The collection consists of 425 works, including paintings by George Inness and Christopher Still, glass by Duncan McClellan and works by Florida photographer Clyde Butcher. The collection was valued at \$1.1 million in March. It opened in May in the Florida International Museum, located at SPC's Downtown Arts Cultural Center at the Downtown Center.
- SPC's Early College Program, in existence since fall 2007 on the Clearwater Campus, has been so successful that it has tripled in size and is now on the Seminole and Tarpon Springs campuses. The program serves 375 students at three locations. The Early College Program is a partnership between SPC and Pinellas County Schools. It offers academically talented 11th and 12th graders the opportunity to earn high school and college credits at the same time.
- In SPC's most recent Graduating Student Survey, 98 percent of the graduates said they would recommend the college to their friends and family.
- SPC has five chapters of Phi Theta Kappa, the international honors organization for two-year colleges. The Eta Nu chapter at the St. Petersburg/Gibbs Campus has won the organization's Most Distinguished Chapter Award a record five times.
- Congressman C.W. Bill Young continues his long and productive friendship with SPC. His recent efforts in support of SPC have included \$4 million for Weapons of Mass Destruction military and emergency responder training; \$6.5 million for counter-drug training programs; federal funding for the 27,000-square-foot Orthotics and Prosthetics facility at SPC's Health Education Center; and federal funds for SPC's National Terrorism Preparedness Institute. Young also has agreed to be involved in a leadership role at SPC's Government Institute, which will be housed at the Seminole Campus. Young opened his congressional office two years ago at the campus.
- The University Partnership Center on the Seminole Campus celebrated its 10th year of offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees to area residents through extensive partnerships. In the fall, the UPC added the National University of Health Sciences in Lombard, Ill., to its list of 16 partner

institutions that offer more than 100 upper-level degrees. Like other institutions affiliated with the UPC, National will partner with the college for classroom space and support services so that students can study at National without leaving the county. One partner, the University of Florida, operates its own College of Dentistry and College of Pharmacy buildings at the site. The college is looking at developing programs of study in complementary and integrative health fields, which are booming. These include such areas as acupuncture, chiropractic, homeopathy, exercise and nutrition and naturopathy.


- The \$36 million renovation project at the Clearwater Campus is continuing. The campus now has a new Math, Science and College of Education Building that occupies the site previously held by the Fine Arts Building. Students are to be moved from the Social Science Building to the old Natural Science Building, and the Social Science Building is to be razed. The project also includes additional parking, a reworked entranceway off Old Coachman Road, as well as upgrades to the campus' utility systems.
- The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools reaffirmed SPC's accreditation; approval of the SACS findings by the Commission was the final step in the rigorous SACS reaffirmation process. In addition, the college's Quality Enhancement Plan also was affirmed.
- The college created a College of Health Sciences department to encompass existing programs such as Dental Hygiene, Health Services Administration, and Orthotics & Prosthetics. The College of Health Sciences was designed to improve efficiency and save money as some program functions and personnel responsibilities will be combined.
- A record 765 graduates received college degrees during SPC's 109th commencement ceremony in May. Of those graduates, 100 were from SPC's College of Education, 230 were from the four-year baccalaureate program, 59 from the Collegiate High School and 33 from the Early College program.
- Nicole Moore-Etheridge became the first person from SPC to earn a Reserve Officer Training Corps commission through the college.
- President Carl M. Kuttler Jr. was awarded two medals at the Russian Embassy in Washington, D.C., one "For the Contribution to the Cause of Friendship" and another celebrating the 200th Anniversary of Consular Service of Russia. Kuttler was awarded the medals in June by Sergey I. Kislyak, Ambassador of Russia to the United States, for Kuttler's 20-year commitment to fostering relations between sister cities St. Petersburg, Russia and St. Petersburg. He also was cited for solidifying the friendship between Russia and the U.S.
- President Carl M. Kuttler Jr. also received the James L. Wattenbarger Award from the Florida Association of Community Colleges and the Tampa Bay Businesses for Culture and Arts Award. Established by the FACC in 2001, the Wattenbarger award is named for James L. Wattenbarger, considered the father of Florida's community college system, a system that began with the founding of St. Petersburg Junior College in 1927. It is given annually to the person who best exemplifies Wattenbarger's love of the state's community college system. Kuttler received the arts award for his knack for facilitating collaborative partnerships between art, education, business, philanthropy and government earned him the prestigious award.
- The new Student Services Building on the St. Petersburg/Gibbs Campus and the Natural Science, Mathematics and College of Education building on the Clearwater campus obtained U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) LEED Gold Certifications, two of the first such buildings in Pinellas County to earn this designation. LEED stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design; Gold is its second highest designation. Both buildings were designed to decrease pollution and negative

impacts on the environment; decrease impact on local aquifers; decrease energy consumption; and increase the quality of indoor air and the indoor working environment. The Student Services Building, designed to serve as the campus' "living room," features a large, energy-efficient industrial ceiling fan, entryway systems that capture dirt and particles; and reflective roofing and paving materials for cooler surfaces. The Natural Science, Mathematics and College of Education building includes "Green Cleaning" products; reflective roofing and paving materials; fourteen preferred parking spaces for fuel-efficient vehicles/carpools; and bicycle storage and shower/changing facilities.

- In July, the Consular Corps College (CCC), the national organization of foreign consuls in the U.S, and St. Petersburg College forged a new educational partnership that will bring the CCC's headquarters to SPC. The Consular Corps College was founded in 1969 with the primary goal of increasing professional communication among foreign consular officers serving in the U.S. The Consular Corps College is a non-profit, non-political professional organization that primarily seeks to serve the foreign consular community in the U.S., estimated at around 4,500, through initial and continuing education, information sharing, networking and other means.
- Overall student enrollment for Fall 2009 increased 15.2 percent over the previous fall. By far, the most impressive enrollment gains were noted in online classes. In two-year programs, enrollment in online classes increased 25.1 percent, while online enrollment in the four-year programs was up an impressive 41.1 percent.
- The 2008-09 unduplicated student headcount in the college's 20 bachelor programs grew to more than 4,000 students, a 24.5% increase from 2007-08. For Fall 2009, traditional and online enrollment in the four-year programs in the College of Public Safety Administration was up 66.7 percent; in the College of Technology & Management, 60.2 percent; and in the School of Paralegal Studies, up 49.1 percent. Since the inception of SPC's Baccalaureate programs, there have been nearly 2,200 graduates.


