





Backgammon Chris Bray

Nordic Open

The Nordic Open is a longstanding fixture in the backgammon calendar. It is held over the Easter weekend and always attracts a strong field. This year's event was in Copenhagen. For once the British contingent had no success, and the final was contested by Hans Liby of Norway and Alfredo Unes of Brazil.

Hans is well-known as a strong player while Alfredo is relatively unknown in Europe. The main difference between the two players was in cube handling, with Hans making but a single blunder in the whole match. Despite that, Alfredo raced into a 12-3 lead in the 17-point match, and things looked grim for Hans. Sensibly he didn't panic, and he slowly reduced Alfredo's lead.


After nearly three hours of play, Hans finally tied the match at 16-16 and so the next game became double match point (DMP). As we have seen in this column before, DMP requires careful handling. The cube is dead and gammons do not count. Back games should not be feared. It is vital to keep all

of one's checkers in play, if at all possible.


Hans (White) got off to a good start in the DMP game and soon built a strong position. As we join it Alfredo (Black) has a 41 to play. He had already erred by dumping a checker on his ace-point when he didn't need to. He now elected to try to win by going forwards and played 24/23*, 12/8. This was asking too much of his checkers, and the surrender of his anchor proved decisive. It gave Hans an easy ride, and he duly won the game and the match. 17-16.

How should Alfredo have played this 41? He should have assessed the position as a prime-versus-prime problem and attempted to build a prime in front of White's last rear checker. 9/5, 6/5 allows White to escape with sixes, so that cannot be correct. There are three sensible plays: 12/8, 6/5; 12/11, 8/4; and my favourite, 8/4, 6/5.

If the slotted checkers are hit, Black will have a well-timed acepoint game. If they are not hit, Black can quickly build a counter prime. As with many before him, Alfredo failed his DMP test.


