

YOUTH PAINTS PICTURE OF WEST AUS. KNIGHT

PERTH. — Champion swimmer Rolf Harris, 17, of Bassendean, holder of the West Australian open 55 yards freestyle record, who is keenly interested in painting, will enter for this year's Archibald Prize.

His entry is to be a portrait of Western Australia's Lieutenant-Governor (Sir James Mitchell).

Sir James gave him four sittings at Government House and Harris completed the actual figure of the Lieutenant-Governor in three hours. He painted in the background later at home.

Harris' mother said that in the Junior Art School's first exhibition held in August, Rolf submitted a painting of Sir James which he had copied from a photograph in a magazine.

Sir James opened the exhibition and Rolf told him how much he would like to paint him from life so he could enter the painting for the Archibald Prize. Sir James consented and arranged the sittings.

Rolf entered a portrait of himself for last year's Archibald Prize. His painting was included in the 60 chosen from 300 entries to be hung in the Sydney Art Gallery, said Mrs. Harris.

Rolf hopes to become a teacher and specialise in art.

Did Britain And France Plan to Attack Russia?

LONDON, September 7.—Documents quoted in an official Swedish White paper asserts that Britain and France were within 48 hours of attacking Russia in 1940, says the Stockholm correspondent of the American Associated Press.

The documents are purported to show that if the Russo-Finnish had continued after March 15, 1940, Britain and France would have sent an initial force of 50,000 troops to north Norway and Finland, but cancelled plans when Finland and Russia signed a peace treaty on March 13, 1940.

The White paper said that the Swedish Consul-General in Paris on March 2, 1940, brought to King Gustav a message from the French Premier (M. Daladier) stating that the truce over Finland was part of a plan for a general offensive to be launched against Russia in the Baku area.

Another Move To Aid Britain In Crisis

CANBERRA.—Australia, in another move to aid Britain meet the dollar crisis, has decided to sell all her current gold production to the United Kingdom.

The Prime Minister (Mr. Chifley) last night announced that already 15,000 ounces of gold worth £1,163,000 (Australian) or about 5,000,000 dollars, have been sold to Britain.

This represents about two months production of gold, and for one year's production Australia will be paid the equivalent of about £9,675,000 (Australian).

Australia's action will not deprive the Commonwealth Bank of the substantial gold reserve built up since the depression period, and of the substantial gold reserve built up and will mean that Britain will get an additional 31,500,000 dollars a year.

In return for Australian gold the Commonwealth Bank will be credited in London with sterling balances by the British Treasurer
